## INCOME TAX

JUSTIFICATION FOR THOSE IN HIGH INCOME BRACKETS
PAYING LESS TAX THAN THOSE IN LOWER BRACKETS

Mr. Eudore Allard (Rimouski): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Finance.

In view of the fact that certain people with an annual income of \$200,000 and over are taxed at a rate not exceeding 10 per cent, that the average taxpayer earning \$7,000 a year is taxed at a rate of 12.14 per cent, and that horse owners will be allowed deductions up to \$7,000, would the Minister consider introducing legislation designed to protect low income people instead of horse owners?

Hon. John N. Turner (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, if the question was put to me, I must point out that there was some confusion around me. I will read it and give a more complete answer.

Mr. Allard: Mr. Speaker, I directed two inquiries to the hon. Minister of Finance, but he did not seem to listen to my remarks.

My question is this: in view of the fact that more than 50 individuals in Canada with revenues exceeding \$200,000 were taxed at a rate of 10 per cent or less, that the average taxpayer earning \$7,000 a year was taxed at a rate of 12.14 per cent rate, and that people owning race- or other horses will be exempted from tax over \$7,000, I ask the hon. Minister if he considered introducing legislation to protect low income people instead of horse owners?

Mr. Turner (Ottawa-Carleton): Mr. Speaker, the question is so detailed that the hon. member deserves a detailed answer, which he will get.
