Business of the House

Mr. Crosbie: He knows a good thing when he sees it. He knows patronage when he sees it.

Mr. Trudeau: If he were a Crosbie he would be an ass; that is what you mean.

Mr. Crosbie: These two firms are in competition. Is the Minister going to stop the conflict of interest? I am not on the board of National Sea nor Fishery Products. I am here trying to keep you honest. Will you keep your appointees honest?

Hon. Pierre De Bané (Minister of Fisheries and Oceans): Mr. Speaker, I would like to remind the Hon. Member that for those companies in which the federal Government has made some commercial investments, some of the board members have been appointed by the federal Government and, of course, particularly with respect to National Sea, the majority is in the hands of the private sector. Of course I can do nothing if the private sector wants to appoint Mr. So-and-So.

Second, I would like to remind the Hon. Member that-

Mr. Crosbie: How can he be the lawyer of Fishery Products?

Mr. De Bané: —due to the insistence of his own Party, we have decided that those commercial investments by the federal Government will be reporting, not to me as Minister of Fisheries and Oceans but to the Minister in charge of CDIC.

Again, if he would reflect on it, he would see that there is no problem whatsoever and Fishery Products is absolutely, totally free to appoint whomever it wants as the legal adviser. Hopefully they will be appointing lawyers from Newfoundland, and maybe some brothers and cousins of the Hon. Member.

Mr. Crosbie: That would be an improvement.
