CORNER STONE LAID BY BISHOP SWEENEY

St. Mark's New Parish House Will Be Splendid Structure.

Last evening at 7:30 o'clock Bishop Sweeney laid the cornerstone of the new parish house of the Church of St. Mark the Evangelist, corner of Cowan Avenue and Queen streets, Parkdale.

After a short service of dedication, the assembly retired to the body of the church, where addresses were delivered by Bishop Sweeney, Ven. Archdeacon Gwynne, who was for many years rector of the parish, and Rev. R. A. Hiltz.

His Lordship Bishop Sweeney commented favorably on the work of his rector, Rev. Mr. Armitage, and his assistants, and paid a splendid tribute to the spirit of co-operative generosity, which had been demonstrated in the present instance, on the part of the parishioners.

St. Mark's is one of the oldest Anglican churches in Toronto, and the extensive addition will add greatly to its appearance. The new structure, which will be three stories high, of gray stone and brick, will cost about \$20,000. A central steam heating plant, and a new pipe organ, costing respectively \$2,000 and \$2,500, will also be installed in the new church.

Among those present were the following: Rt. Rev. W. D. Ross, D.D., assistant Bishop of Toronto; Rev. W. L. Armitage, B.A., rector of the parish; Churchwardens Thomas Jenkins and J. A. Hethington; F. K. Drayton, K.C.; George Gouinlock, Stephen St. A. Sewall, all members of the synod of Ontario; Alexander T. Dargh, contractor, and Messrs. Ellis and Conroy, the architects.

WORTH KNOWING.

If almonds are put into cold water and allowed to come just to the boiling point they blanch easily. Plunge in cold water as soon as the skins are taken off; then they will not change color.

Any cream or custard pie should have the under crust baked first. See that the filling is sufficiently firm to hold its shape when the pie is cut. Any pie of this sort is tastier and more attractive to the eye if served with delicately-browned meringue.

When about to roast a joint cover it with a rinsed saucer, or piece of ham or bacon, and cook with it on. This will save the trouble of constant basting and will protect the joint from burning or drying.

Cold boiled potatoes cut lengthwise and broiled are delicious if served piping hot with plenty of butter, pepper and salt.

When next serving roast beef, save all the drippings in the pan. Spread evenly on carefully-toasted bread and put in the oven to brown. This is excellent for luncheon.

PINEAPPLE COMBINATIONS.

The pineapple lends itself to many combinations. It may be put up with many sorts of fruits and combined variously in fruit salads and desserts.

The fruit salads are becoming increasingly popular, and the pineapple is an especially agreeable constituent in these. It is no longer thought necessary to use a mayonnaise dressing for them. The whipped cream may be piled on top, even with a French dressing, if the oil used is a sweet and mild one. The oils imported from France are coming up to the requirements of our pure food laws are best.

If combined with the grapefruit or orange for a salad the two may be allowed to stand together for a time and the juice then poured off for use in a dessert or syrup. These combinations are improved if a little brown sherry is added to them before they are drained and covered with the dressing.
