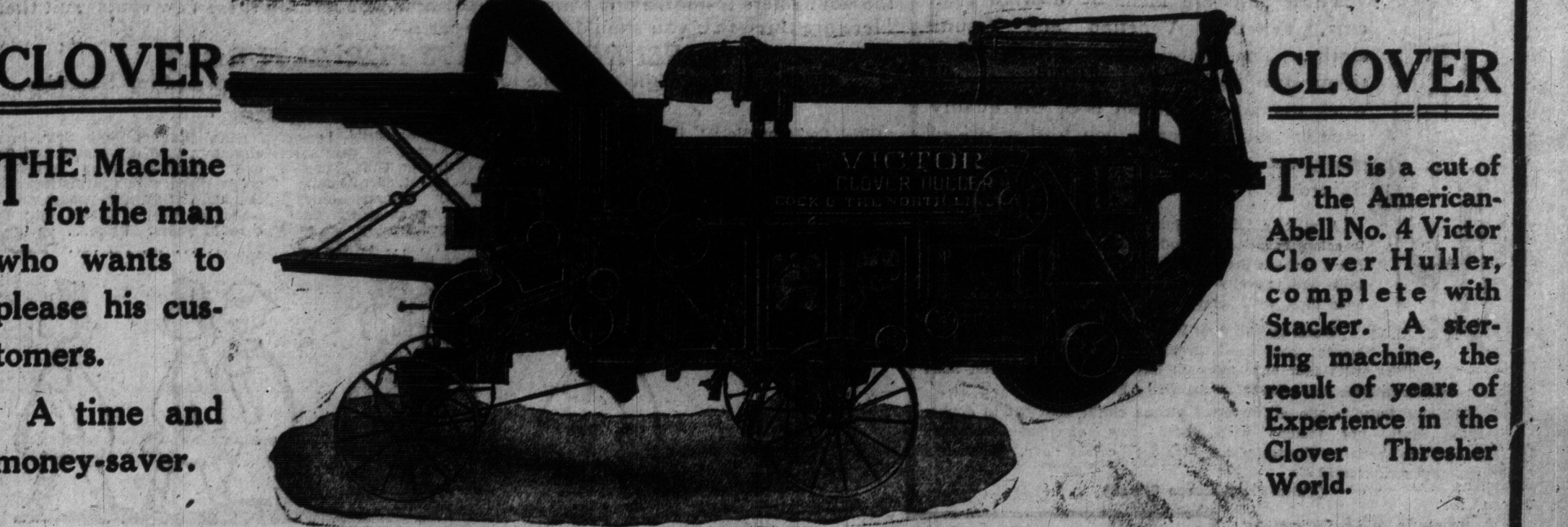

DOUBLE FORGERY

Frank Smith Works Slek Game on Chatham Merchant.

Chatham, Ont., Sept. 29.—(Special)—A man named Frank Smith worked a peculiar forgery in this city yesterday. He presented a cheque for ten dollars to William Stone, gent's furnisher, signed John Johnson, endorsed Frank Smith. He bought four dollars worth of goods and received six dollars in change. He then asked Mr. Stone to show him how a cheque should be drawn for, and Mr. Stone wrote out a dummy cheque the same as the one he had cashed. Smith took the dummy to the Hotel Miles, where he had little difficulty in getting it cashed. The proprietor of the hotel afterwards noticed the forgery and had Smith arrested.
