WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan er Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his nomestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, shely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutles—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (incansing the time required to earn homestead patenc) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead righ, and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.
