

MAYOR'S CHAIR WANTED NOW

Controllers Hocken and Church Aspire to Be Chief Magistrate and Ald. Dunn is Mentioned as a Compromise— Deficit Expected on Civic Car Lines.

With Mayor Geary's appointment as corporation counsel, the problem as to who will be placed in the position of chief magistrate for the balance of the year must be dealt with by the city council, and an interesting situation is promised before the vacancy is filled.

It is expected that the council will be pretty evenly divided on the question. Controller Church is vice-president and also the oldest member of council in point of the greatest consecutive number of years' service.

Mr. Morley read a number of letters resulting to the good work done by the board and trusting the campaign would prove a huge success.

Commissioner Harris' letter to the effect that he did not favor the proposal to give a temporary service on Gerrard street was interpreted by the board of control yesterday as a notice that they would not be responsible for any loss which might be incurred in the operation of the service.

Hydro is All Right. Hon. Adam Beck stated yesterday that owing to the great increase in the demand for power in Toronto, the Hydro-Electric Commission had decided that the new rate should be \$15.50 per horsepower instead of \$15 as was formerly announced.

Money Tight. The board of control yesterday passed a recommendation asking the council to put up a \$250,000 guarantee for the trip to England which the National Chorus will make next year.

BOARD OF TRADE CAMPAIGN HAS GOOD RESULTS

Over 100 Applications Are Filed at First Luncheon of Five-Days Membership Campaign—Workers Wax Enthusiastic and Results Exceed Expectations.

Over a hundred applications were filed at the first day's luncheon of the workers in the five-day membership campaign of the board of trade held in the St. Charles restaurant yesterday.
