RAILWAYS AFTER MUSKOKA RAIL

C.P.R. and G.T.R.—Making Active Preparations for Bitter Competition for Holding Travel This Summer.

The Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk railways are preparing to fight each other to the bitter finish for supremacy in Muskoka.

This war between the roads may mean that intending tourists will be whirled to Muskoka in about one and a half hours, and that they will get a return ticket for something like 50 cents.

To consider what each road has done in preparation for this fight is astounding. In the first place, the C. P. R. has spent \$1,000,000 on the portion of their Suburban line between Bolton and Bala.

When the C. P. R. announced three years ago that they were going to build a line from Bolton, 46 miles west of Toronto, to Sudbury, the other roads smiled.

What their tactics will be is only known to Charles Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk. His line does not run thru the heart of the Muskoka line, like the other two roads.

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CHINA, FAMINE-STRICKEN MAY BECOME GRAVE DANGER

U. S. Officials Confirm Reports of the Sufferings of Millions of People.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Mail reports from American consular officers in China, which reached the state department to-day regarding the famine and the resulting conditions, still further confirm the stories of suffering and hardship among the people in the districts affected.

Consul Haynes at Nanking says that the famine is ten times worse than anything known in that part of the empire for the past forty years.

Consul-General Rodgers at Shanghai says inquiry which he has made, and that to this end is taking sheep, oxen or buffaloes in pawn for two cents each, keeping them thus until next spring, when it will return them.

THAW'S DEFENCE. Continued From Page 1. For his act. A preponderance of evidence to establish that fact will be adduced.

The defence is convinced that should the district attorney call Evelyn Nesbit Thaw to the witness stand, the mere fact of the slaying of Stanford White, when that could be easily proven by other eye-witnesses, would not be sufficient to commit an act that would be prejudicial to his own case, but would appear before the jury as a confession.

The two men of the jury who proved acceptable to the state and to Thaw and his counsel were Chas. D. Newton, a retired railroad officer, and Louis H. Borden, a prominent business man.

Mr. Newton, the New York representative of a Philadelphia wholesale candy concern, who is not more than thirty years of age, both Mr. Jerome and Mr. Hartridge, the leading lawyer for the defence, were congratulated upon securing two such capable jurors.

In accepting the latter Mr. Jerome dwelt for some time upon the question of reasonable doubt. He questioned the talesman searching as to his differences between a reasonable doubt and a possible doubt.
