**NOT READY TO BACK CITY IN EXPROPRIATION FIGHT**

Labor Council Doubts Wisdom of City's Move While Favoring Civic Ownership.

The District Labor Council is not prepared for the present to support the city in its application for power to expropriate the Toronto Electric Light Co. At last night's meeting Delegate Rooney suggested that the council should seek to strengthen the city's hands at the present critical stage of the proceedings, by a resolution approving the course taken, and that proposal was not seconded with open arms.

President Thompson insisted that it was better to hold until the situation had resolved itself somewhat. He was not clearly known just what would be the results if the city obtained the required power, and the interests of the citizens might be injuriously affected. While the same caution was shown by the majority of the delegates, it was declared on all sides that the council stood firmly for municipal ownership, and the suggestion of Delegate Worrell that the Public Ownership League should be supported, was received with evident approval.

Incidentally there was some warm criticism of the attitude of the company towards organized labor, because alleged methods being employed around the corridors of the parliament buildings.

"There's lots of lobbying going on," was asserted.

"Yes, and there's lots of money going, too," added the chairman.

The pernicious effects of the moving picture machine on the youthful mind were drawn attention to by one member, who said he had seen little boys and girls standing on their tip-toes or stools to look into the machines.

"They're not fit for grown-up people, let alone children," he asserted.

The educational committee will report.

The agreement with Joseph Marks, Londoner, the publisher of the Toronto of the Industrial Banner as the official local labor organ, was approved.

"The proposition that a basal league, or malt sugar from union establishments, be formed, will be considered."

Edification was given the "Cab Drivers' agreement."

**HAMILTON HAPPENINGS**  
HARRY GALLAGHER GETS OFF WITH TESTIMONY AT INQUEST

Elderly Flamboro Farmer Slashes Throat With Razor in Fit of Despondency.

Hamilton, April 4.—Harry Gallagher will be released from the jail Friday morning. He was arrested on a G. T. R. train a week ago and sentenced to pay \$30 or serve a month in jail. It was supposed that he might be able to throw some light on the Elliott murder at Port Credit, and the police were requested to hold him. His brother arrived this evening, and will pay the fine in the morning. When Gallagher is released a subpoena to attend the inquest on the murder case as a witness will be served upon him.

It is proposed to have the children form a procession and march, headed by a band to the park.

E. A. Manning was appointed on the board of examiners for the entrance examinations of the board which will permit parents of children Dr. Roberts finds in their children. The junior teachers applied for more pay, but their application was refused.

The Retail Merchants' Association held a meeting this evening to arrange for the convention which will be held in Hamilton on July 3 and 4. The following officers were elected: Adam Balaistyne, president; James Dunlop and J. G. Volpe, vice-presidents; Geo. Klein, secretary; A. Zimmerman, treasurer. The association passed resolutions against the Motion Picture permit co-operative staff, and the bill with reference to the sale of patent medicines.

The public library board will allow children of the fourth grade of the schools to the privileges of the institution upon the presentation of their application signed by the principal of the school.

**TREASURE IN OLD BOXES BUTCHER BOY'S PURCHASE**

Unclaimed Articles Left in Trains, Put up at Auction, Bring Good Prices.

The auction sale of unclaimed articles left by travelers on the Grand Trunk System during the past twelve months was held yesterday in Henderson's auction rooms. From the opening to the close the salesroom was crowded.

The bidding was spirited throughout and a marked caution characterized the sales on the part of nearly all the buyers, the general policy of the crowd being to risk nothing much beyond what the exterior promised. Even then considerable discount was allowed for appearances, which have long been considered deceitful, even as a suit case or a saratoga trunk might be like the proverbial "winked sulphur-crested cockatoo" without, but dead men's bones within."

At least that was the jocular impression of some, as when Mr. Henderson said, "This is a superior article and don't forget it was a lady's trunk," a voice from the crowd called out, "Is the lady in it?" No doubt he had in his mind the gruesome reminiscence of some murders in the past, when the victims were packed in a trunk and shipped as ordinary baggage.

But there was one small traveling box left behind by a young lady and contained mysteries too deep for the young mind to unravel and contrivances too complex and mysterious for the immature young person to understand. There were puffs and powders, rouges and enamels, fringes and fancy curts, tweezers and crayons, pomades and coat-plaster, all of these were more or less self-explanatory, but there were some other devices and adjustments the use of which to the butcher boy seemed inexplicable, but possibly well understood in the modern feminine world.

There is no doubt but the left and right articles on our railroads reveal and disclose much of the subtle and inner life of the people of the day—modern habit and practice that never appears on the surface of modern society, much of the secret foibles and carefully concealed deceptions of some of the men and women of our time.
