Henley-on-Thames, June 23.—(Special.)—The Argonauts, comfortably housed at the Five Horse Shoes and thoroughly settled down for their short course of training here, are being overrun with callers, all of whom they seem glad to see. The new boats need considerable alteration before the boys can sit them right, and then the big Canadian contingent expect to see them show the strokes that will ultimately carry them to victory.

Among the many callers to-day were: Dr. Jack Warbrick and Frank Moss. Warbrick says he has given up lacrosse for good and that he will return to Canada in the early fall. Moss used to be a member of the Argonauts and is now rowing with a crew of the Kingston Club of London.

These young medics are finishing up in London, and, having watched all the crews at work on the Thames, are in a position to tell something of what their brother Canucks will do. Both are confident, and Warbrick expressed the opinion as the eight returned from their spin that they would win notwithstanding the formidable strength of their opponents. He says that no one need be surprised to see the Canadians land the three trophies they have come over after.
