The Thistle party was unable to make any headway, as the gas stifled the work-ers. The Fraterville party went fully two miles under the earth until a heavy fall of slate was encountered. 
Bomb Found in Emperor Francis Joseph Railway Compartments.

London, May 20 .- The correspondent of The Daily Chronicle at Buda Pesth reports the frustration of a plot against the life of Emperor Francis Joseph.

The Emperor was recently going on a night train from Vienna to Buda Pesth. In the final inspection of the imperial train in the terminus of the State railroad at Vienna, made 10 minutes before His Majesty's arrival there, a bomb covered with paper was found in the Emperor's compartments. was evidently calculated that this bomb would explode the moment His Majesty entered the car.
