What is included in contraband of war is weapons, ammunition, equipments, engines and all the appliances used in war Those to be regarded and judged as pirates, with all the rigor of the law, are captains, masters, officers and two-thirds of the crew of vessels, which, not being American, shall commit acts of war against Spain even if provided with letters of marque issued by the United

RUMORS OF A CABINET CRISIS IN SPAIN. A dispatch to the New York World from Madrid says: A ministerial crisis has added a new danger to the situation in Spain. Premier Sagasta tendered the resignation of the whole cabinet. He did this, he explained, in order to make it easier for the queen regent to consult the leading statesmen, senors and admirals of all parties, so as to judge whether her present counselors or new men would be better able to face the gravest crisis of this century.

In reply to a question as to the meaning of his visit to Washington he said: "I am not charged with negotiations of any sort or kind respecting a treaty of alliance or otherwise with Great Britain, nor would such a treaty tend to promote closer relations between the two countries. A thorough understanding can only, in my opinion, be based upon a conviction on the part of each country that it has the sympathy, and is likely, in certain contingencies, to have at least the moral support of the other. I do not see that a treaty would

which must be based upon acts as well as expressions of good will and es-"Circumstances have recently enabled Great Britain to act in such a manner as to cause many people in the United States, and particularly, as I happen to know, certain members of the Senate and House of Representatives hitherto considered unfriendly to England, to believe, and, in my opinion, rightly to believe, that we now have the sympathy, not only of the British people, but of their government and colonies. No one familiar with foreign affairs can doubt for a moment that the two branches of the Anglo-Saxon race, acting in concert, would be simply irresistible.

PESSIMISTIC SPANIARDS. London, April 25 .- The Madrid cor-Secretary Meiklejohn has submitted to respondent of the Daily Telegraph says: In well-informed parliamentary circles a pessimistic view is taken as to the upshot of the war. Even the politicians who are patriotically supporting the government accuse the Liberal cabinet of having brought about the war and of having made no preparations to carry it on. Those who have studied the question affirm that the war will be of very short duration, and that when it is terminated those who are responsible for it will be called to account. The war revenue measure, it is estimated, will produce about \$100,000,000 in revenue. The tax on beer, ale and fomented liquors is increased from \$1 to \$2 a barrel, but no rebate for unused beer or destroyed stamps is allowed. The tax on tobacco snuff is increased to 12 cents a pound, upon cigars to \$4 per 1,000; weighing more than three pounds per 1,000, and \$2 on cigars weighing less than three pounds per 1,000; \$4 upon cigarettes weighing more than three pounds per 1,000, and \$2 on cigarettes weighing less than three pounds.

BLAZING AWAY. On board the United States flagship New York, off Havana, April 24-Noon. -Morro batteries again opened fire on the United States fleet this morning, without effect

Off Havana, April 24-Noon.-During the early morning the Morro Castle Detroit, April 25.—Some time Tuesday batteries again opened fire on the fleet, but without the slightest effect. There have been no casualties among our forces up to the hour of writing, and not a single shot has been fired against the batteries.

About 9 o'clock this morning, the New York proceeded several miles closer in shore. Not a breath of wind stirred the sea, and the heat was terrible. Chaplain Royce held regular Sunday services and rendered sacred music, playing, among other sacred airs, "Onward Christian Soldiers." Morro Castle and the city of Havana can be plainly seen through glasses.

NO RAW RECRUITS FOR CUBA. Washington, April 25.—Secretary Sherman said today that for the present the insurgent army would do the greater part of the fighting in Cuba. recruits into Cuba until thoroughly inured to the hradships of military life, and that probably the regulars would also be held in this country until later in the season. The secretary expressed the opinion that Admiral Sampson's fleet would take the first opportunity to form a junction with Gomez's army.


OLD GLORY TRAMPLED ON. Kingston, Jamaica, April 25 .- When the steamer Ely left Guantanamo on Friday last with United States Consul Triay, a Spanish mob, including many soldiers, filled the public square and adjacent streets, yelling, "Death to the Yankees!" Several American flags were soiled, torn, trampled and treated with indignities. Some naturalized Americans were compelled to take part in the insulting work under threat of death if they refused.

HAVANA TERROR-STRICKEN. Havana, Cuba, April 25.—Special— The United States will begin the bombardment of Havana today. Rear Admiral Sampson has sent notice of his intention to Mr. Gollan, the British ambassador here, who, acting under instructions from his government, is in charge of the United States consulate here. Mr. Gollan has told Captain General Blanco that real war is about to begin. The city is terror-stricken. Admiral Sampson's notice simply stated that he intended to begin the bombardment. It is not known whether his ships will confine themselves to the batteries and, after siencing them, take Havana with his sailors and marines, or will try to compel surrender by shelling the city itself.
