## WESTERN ONTARIO

Mr. George Black, of Blenheim, is dead, aged 83 years.  
John Noulton, an old colored resident of Erandford, is dead, aged 82 years. He was an ex-slave.

Wm. Oldershaw, sen., one of the oldest residents of Chatham, died Tuesday, aged 76 years. He was a mason by trade, and built many of Chatham's largest buildings. His wife, four sons and two daughters survive.

Bogus American half dollars are being circulated just now around Blenheim. The bogus coin has a very good ring and is a very good imitation of the genuine in looks, but can be easily detected on account of its being light weight and slippery feeling, peculiar to soft metal. The bogus bears the date of 1885.

Warren Totten, Q.C., of Woodstock, is suffering from an attack of partial paralysis. Mr. Totten was seized with paralysis of the left side the other morning and has been rather seriously ill since. Dr. Mearns reports the patient somewhat better, however. Mr. Totten was taken once before with a similar attack.

In the Toronto Presbytery the call of the East Presbyterian Church to Rev. R. Atkinson, of Berlin, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum was approved of, and Rev. J. Kay, of Deer Park, and Rev. J. W. Rae, of Toronto, were appointed to attend a meeting of Guelph Presbytery, to be held on March 25, to discuss the matter with that body.

Galt Reformer: The Trading Stamp Company has deposited \$70, being the Galt transient traders' fee of \$50 and costs, pending the decision of the high court as to whether or not the company is amenable to transient traders' regulation and tax. In consequence the case against the company in the Galt police court this morning was not proceeded with.

Petitions are being circulated around St. Thomas, asking the legislature not to give the council power to amend the municipal act so that the city can license hacks, teamsters, etc. The object of the petition is to have the police put under the control of a commission. The council, however, will not appoint a commission even if the government refuses the legislation asked for.

Dutton Advance: It was stated in the St. Thomas Times on Friday that Thomas March, a former resident of Dunwich, was murdered in Idaho a few

days ago by his housekeeper, and that Mr. Marsh, Dutton, brother of the murdered man, has left for that state to learn the particulars of the affair and bring the body home. This is news to the friends of the deceased in Dunwich. Mr. Robert March did not go to Idaho, and the relative of the deceased have yet to learn that he met his death in the manner stated.

A young traveling peddler named Brechenridge, while driving to Galt on Saturday afternoon, lost his wife, and despite much search on his own part, and on the part of the local police, has not been able to find her. On encountering a high hill near the town, and walked up the incline, and after proceeding a few yards past the top the husband stopped and awaited the coming of his wife. She did not appear, and anxiously he prosecuted a search for her, but could not obtain the slightest clue. Wednesday he found his wife living with a family in Brantford, but she firmly refuses to return to him.

## SWEET SOUNDS OF MUSIC

The Celebrated Banda Rossa One of the Finest Musical Organizations That Ever Visited London.

The famous Banda Rossa, under the direction of Signor Sorrentino, appeared at the Grand Opera House last night. The attendance was not as large as this fine musical organization merited, but the audience displayed much enthusiasm and appreciation. The Banda Rossa is without doubt the finest band that ever visited this city. In all their selections they displayed those striking and brilliant qualities which have placed them in the front rank as musicians. The selections were remarkable in power, in the general volume of tone, well-marked accentuation, and definition of rhythm, crispness of execution in quick passages, and a fervent style of expression. Every number was marked by perfect repose and smoothness. "The Pilgrims' Chorus" in Tannhauser was given a remarkably brilliant rendering. The "Italian Liberty March" by Sorrentino was another number in which the brilliancy and vigorous style of the band seemed most appropriate. In the finale to the second act in "Lucia," the violent efforts seemed at times to be a little heavy for the confines of the Grand Opera House, but the harmony and expression were perfect. Many lighter selections were given, both as encores and as regular programme numbers, but they call for no comment, with the exception that they aroused great enthusiasm among the audience, and were, of course, played with the ease which might be expected from the band in dealing with such trifles. The programme appealed to all classes of musical tastes. Mrs. Marshall Pease, the contralto soloist, has a well-cultivated and sweet voice, and sang several numbers to the evident satisfaction of her hearers. Those who were fortunate enough to hear this famous musical organization enjoyed one of the greatest treats of their lives. A return engagement would be welcome news to a great many Londoners.

## MAIL CLERK'S TROUBLE

Disappeared From London on Being Accused of Irregularities.

The postal authorities here have not up to date received any information of the whereabouts of John Dobson Flood, a mail clerk on the M. C. R. running between here and Courtright. Flood left about three weeks ago, after having received a letter from Inspector McWhinney to present himself at the postoffice here and explain certain alleged irregularities. About this time Flood's young wife also disappeared. Investigation has been made, and it is supposed registered letters to the extent of \$1,000 were taken by him. Flood is a young man without family, a nephew of Senator Dobson, of Lindsay, and was appointed in 1884. The postoffice authorities will see little about the matter, living in hopes that Flood will call and explain matters. Mr. G. O'Connor, of Niagara Falls, has been appointed to Flood's position.

## WITH STEAM

Wilkesbarre's Postmaster Opened Business Men's Letters and Furlined the Contents—Caught in the Act.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., March 10.—Edward F. Bogert, postmaster of Wilkesbarre, was arrested yesterday, charged with tampering with the United States mails. Several complaints were recently lodged with the postal authorities at Washington that mail was disappearing, and the postal authorities detailed two secret service men on the case.

Last night after the mail from Baltimore and Washington had been distributed, Bogert entered the office and was seen to take several letters from the boxes and then go into his private office and carefully draw down a curtain.

was acting as a clerk, turned out an electric light in the rear end of the office, this being a signal to two other secret service men, who were stationed outside. The man on the inside carefully admitted his associates. The two men went at once to Bogert's private office, and without the ceremony of knocking, entered, and there found the postmaster seated at his desk, on which lay three letters addressed to prominent business men, all of them opened by the steaming process. The postmaster was taken before United States Commissioner Hahn, where he gave bail in \$4,000 for his appearance. Bogert, besides being editor of the Evening Leader, is a member of a large number of lodges. His brother, the late Joseph P. Bogert, was prominent in Democratic county and state politics, and at the time of his death was postmaster.

## THE ORANGMEN

Grand Lodge of Ontario West Convened in Barrie.

The Order Reported To Be In Flourishing Condition.

Barrie, March 10.—The Orange grand lodge of Ontario West opened its annual meeting yesterday afternoon. Mr. D. M. Jermyn, of Wiarton, the grand master, in the chair.

The grand master delivered a comprehensive address, in which he reported that the order is still progressing. Substantial gain has been made during the year, and the delegates were proudly assured that the grand lodge of Ontario West is still the banner provincial grand lodge of the world, both numerically and otherwise. The grand master made touching reference to the dead, mentioning specially the late Mr. Dalton McCarthy and Rev. Dr. Chiniquy, also Rev. Dr. Kane, of Belfast, whose usefulness he eulogized highly. In conclusion Mr. Jermyn noted with pleasure the rapid growth of the moral benefit fund.

Mr. William Lee, grand secretary, reported the organization of two new county lodges, viz., South Kent and North Muskoka; also an application for the formation of a new county lodge taking in the Rainy River district.

Warrants for the opening of four new primary lodges have been issued. Nos. 1,092, in North Grey, and 1,225, in Essex, which were reported dormant, have been resuscitated. No. 976, in Elgin, has returned its warrant. The reports from county lodges show: In-stitutions, 1,292; joined by certificate, 360; reinstated, 243; loss by death, 166; and by expulsion, 41, the net increase being about 1,700.

M. E. F. Clarke, M.P., grand treasurer, reported cash on hand and in bank, \$1,524 55; arrears outstanding, \$822 10.

The work at the afternoon session was largely routine. At the close William Lockhart, P.G.M., was presented with a gold watch and chain.

## WHEAT SUFFERED

February Weather Was Tough on the Michigan Crop.

Lansing, Mich., March 10.—The Michigan crop report for February has been issued, and there is a diversity of opinion as to the damage done by the excessively cold weather of February. The general statement of the farmers is that the intense cold was not accompanied by a great deal of snow, and as a result the ground froze deeper than usual. It is agreed that the peach crop has been affected, and it is declared by a large number that the plum and pear crops will be much shorter.

The condition of wheat, compared with an average on March 1, was, for the state, 74 per cent. The average condition was, in the southern counties 74 per cent, in the central counties 71 per cent, and in the northern counties 87 per cent. The figures indicate that the weather for the month has not been such as tends to preserve its vitality, although many correspondents think that much wheat is killed now.

It is also concluded from reports that 25 per cent of the potato crop has been ruined.

## Sugar Beets in Canada

"Beets" writes a second letter to The Advertiser, as follows: "We certainly owe a great debt of gratitude to those men who spend money and time in perfecting experiments on anything which goes to benefit the community at large, and we, as farmers, have much to be thankful for in this line. In our last letter, our attention was specially directed to sugar beets as a profitable root crop, and when we take into consideration the health of our stock, as well as the object of the returns we get from them, not only in preparing them for the market, but in their actual value to ourselves, it becomes a very important question, 'What to feed them?'

Good roots to animals the same as good fruits to men, act as a laxative to the system and cannot be dispensed with without injury. In feeding stock of any kind, this is a very important

feature, but if this is the only point to be aimed at, perhaps as great an error is made, as not giving it due consideration. Then, that class of roots which will give the greatest food value and also act as a laxative properly is certainly the most valuable.

We all know that sugar is to a certain extent fattening, and there is perhaps no root in which this quality is as well blended with the other qualities we require in a good line of roots as in the sugar beet. But as the cultivation and expense of these has been greater in the past than some of the inferior roots, these latter have had the preference in growing. A few years ago I obtained some seed from Wm. Rennie, seedman of Toronto, of what he calls the New Danish Beet, and of which he has the sole control in Canada. This Danish beet has fulfilled the highest expectations and provides just what farmers have been wanting for a long time. It grows to a large size, some specimens weighing over 32 pounds each, which places it a strong rival to nangelis in respect to size. It is easily harvested, a good keeper and possesses in itself all the leading qualities we look for in other roots.

The best way is to give some of it a fair trial for yourself and be convinced.

### UNDER A FALLEN TREE.

Brougham, Ont., March 10. — John Cowan, aged 51, of this village, lies at the point of death. While he was cutting wood near Goodwood, he was struck by a falling tree, and his legs were badly smashed. The other workmen arrived just in time to prevent him from attempting to cut his legs off with an axe to free himself. It was found necessary to amputate one leg just above the knee. Mr. Cowan now lies in a dangerous condition.
