A resolution was passed strongly in favor of the establishment of an institution to which incriminations may be committed by legal process.

Mr. Justice W. R. Riddell most strongly supported the establishment of such a special institution in the Province and under public control. He considered that the time has come when drastic measures might well be adopted.

REJECTS FINE OFFER.

Windsor, Ont., May 29.—William M. Cameron, who is visiting his father, Donald Cameron, has refused an offer to go to the Yukon and take charge of the mining interests of the Guggenheimers. Mr. Cameron is engaged by one of the largest mining firms on the Rand, South Africa, and is paid a large salary as an expert engineer. The offer he received to go to the Yukon was for more money than he is paid in South Africa.

MONUMENTS VALUE AS EDUCATORS

Mrs. F. G. Leonard's Interesting Paper at Daughters of Empire Gathering.

At the annual meeting of the Daughters of the Empire, held in Toronto, Mrs. F. G. Leonard, regent of the London chapter, read a paper on "Monuments as Educators." The paper was given by special request, and it will prove of particular interest to Londoners at present, when a move is on foot by the Daughters of the Empire to erect a monument to the soldiers from this city and district who lost their lives in the South African war. It was as follows:

It has been said that a man's first duty is to his country, and no proverb ever expressed a truth in finer or simpler language. No man is worthy of being called a citizen of any land, unless he is willing to do his part toward making his nation the greatest and his people the finest in the world.

The child is father to the man, and if the right principles are instilled into the minds of the youth of our country, we will, later on, have citizens who will be ever ready to bear their share of their country's work as they should. If the child is taught that it is his sacred duty to reverence his elders, to uphold his country's honor and to strive to make her a queen among nations, we will have men in time to come who will take a firm stand for what is right, who will discountenance graft and patronage, the two great modern evils, and who, when the necessity arises will be prepared to give their lives for their country, as becomes good patriots.

To produce this the youth must be educated with these points always before him. The word "education" is derived from the Latin, meaning to lead or bring, and as we lead and bring up our children along the proper lines, so we will be educating and developing citizens who will in days to come place our glorious Canada in the vanguard of the nations.

Nations have risen again and again and flourished great and triumphant for a time, only to fall to the ground in the end as did the idol with feet of clay. Of Carthage, that great African world center, the city of Hannibal and Hasdrubal, Rome's great rival in war and trade, nothing remains but a heap of drifted ruins. Greece exists only as a buffer between Europe and the Turkish Empire. Egypt, Rome, Assyria, Babylon and Spain, as known of old, have vanished, and if they exist at all are but shadows of their former greatness.

And why? Simply because, with power and wealth came indolence, and indulgence and a corruption of personal and national morals which destroys and eats away the corner stone of the foundations on which a nation's greatness rests. And the nations of the world, which have contributed so much to the country's greatness. They neglected to teach them, to bring them up with the idea that their first duty was to their country and that they were all guardians of their country's honor. And if our Canada, our Empire, is to escape a kindred fate, we must be ever on the primary causes of an otherwise inevitable downfall.

But how is this to be accomplished? What is the best way to teach our children these great truths? Undoubtedly the study of the glorious history of our country, and of the path of duty to this end. The examples of those who have been weighed and found not wanting on the battlefield, in the council or in the everyday existence of the average citizen, must be and are a splendid incentive to others.

What better means can we have of impressing these examples upon our children and children's children, than by erecting monuments to commemorate our great soldiers, our heroes and our statesmen. Canada is as yet a young country, but the pages of history are bright with tales of gallant deeds, heroic sacrifices and of paths of duty leading to glory and the grave. Look at Champlain, La Salle, Simcoe, and those other numberless heroes, who have laid the foundations of a nation in a primeval forest, and we see the same spirit which today in the hearts of their descendants is building for us an Empire in what, only a few years ago, was called the Great Lone Land.

The early history of Canada is crimson with blood, blood of the aborigine in his hopeless struggle against the white man; blood of the French and English on opposite sides, striving for the mastery in this highest of all continents, and blood of these two fighting side by side to preserve our country for the meteor flag of England, no longer French and English, but united Canadians. Heroes such as Frontenac and DuRoi, Wolfe and Montcalm, Brock and de Salaberry, Tecumseh and Fitzgibbon and the other nameless but not less meritorious, have furnished us with examples of loyalty and gallantry which should never be forgotten.

And in that great struggle, not altogether bloodless, of our forefathers has made Canada the brightest jewel in the crown of empire, there were men who served their country no less faithfully and valiantly than the warriors. The names of Baldwin and Lafontaine, of the martyred McGee, of Howe and Wiley, of Macdonald and Brown, of Macdonald and Carleton, should be known to the road of the present day politician, and should stimulate him to strive against those evils which, if not resisted, will inevitably destroy.

Turning from the lightning of war and the thunder of politics to our peaceful everyday existence, we find men and women who have proven themselves citizens no less heroic than those of Sparta and Carthage. On Wellington street in Ottawa there is a statue of Sir Galahad, that splendid knight, servant of old, an appropriate figure, placed to remind us of the young man who sacrificed his life in the icy river

GROCCERS DIVIDED ON PICNIC MATTER

One Section Will Go to Toronto, While the Other Will Go to Niagara Falls.

The Retail Grocers' Association of London, at a largely-attended meeting held last night, decided to hold the annual excursion to Toronto this year, and to go via the C. P. R. The fare will be \$2.35 for the round trip. A committee, composed of Messrs. Shaw, McCormick, Drake and Ryan, was named to complete the arrangements with the railway, and in conjunction with the executive committee of the association, to decide upon the date. It is altogether likely the picnic will be held on a Wednesday in July. It was reported that certain firms which have formed an association of their own had been approached with a kindred fare, and that they had decided to join with the Toronto picnic party, but that they had refused. The firms referred to, it was stated, intend going to Niagara Falls again this year. The committee appointed to wait on No. 2 Committee of the city council for the purpose of having licenses for pushcart men abolished, reported that the pushcart business, owing to the fact that the districts in which it can be carried on have been greatly curtailed, will probably die a natural death in London. It was decided, however, to name a committee to draw up a revised district in which pushcarts should be allowed to operate, and to submit it as a suggestion to No. 3 committee. Messrs. Lea, Ryan and Donaghy were named a committee to purchase a suitable present for President Harry Tanahan, who was married to an estimable young lady of Wyoming on Tuesday last.

TAKES TO GOOD WORK

How Duchess of Marlborough Seeks to Forget Marital Troubles.

New York, May 29.—Yesterday's cable dispatch from London, telling that the Duchess of Marlborough had been instrumental in fitting up a home near the Euston Square railway station for the benefit of the wives and children of poor prisoners is an additional fact tending to show that in her marital sorrows the duchess—"Our heroines"—has turned for solace to the work of bringing joy to others.

The merest mention of the duchess brings to the mind of New Yorkers the recollection of that wedding of hers in St. Thomas' Church in the autumn of 1861. Little more than a decade has gone by in which Consuelo Vanderbilt's wedded experience has not exactly followed the primrose lane of a number of international marriages.

When Marlborough came over here to take back the daughter of a Vanderbilt as a bride, she brought with her a fortune of \$250,000, which was the largest sum ever brought to this country by a bride.

My clients at home are only the heads of some of the oldest nobility in England. But it is all right. This is Mrs. Vanderbilt's time. There will be another day when I would not be at all surprised if in the future the most welcome visitor at Blenheim Castle would be Mr. W. K. Vanderbilt," and Mr. Milward very significantly emphasized the "Mr." and the duke has been more happy to see his father-in-law than Mrs. Vanderbilt, because it is the former who has held the money bag.
