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**Twelve-Year-Old Shakespeare
Child Meets Instant Death.**

ST. MARYS, Aug. 7.—Isabella Herold, 12-year-old daughter of John Herold, storekeeper, of Shakespeare, was instantly killed in a motor accident on the St. Marys-Stratford road, two miles

The tragedy occurred opposite the Hugh Kelly farm residence, and was caused by the sideswiping of an Overland touring car, driven by Mr. Herold, and a Russell-Knight touring car, driven by Miss Halliday of Guelph. The Herold machine was struck a glancing blow and knocked over the curb, turning over on its side, and struck the child across the breast, causing instant death.

Mr. Herold, father of the dead girl, was rendered unconscious for some time.

The other occupants of both cars were bruised and cut, but not seriously. The Halliday car, in which were Miss Mrs. Halliday of Guelph, three daughters, and Miss Lynch, was following the Herold machine, into the road. Miss Halliday attempted to pass, first on the left side, and then on the right. According to the eye-witnesses, she swung her car too far over to the right in passing, and left the road. The Herold car was occupied by Mrs. Herold, the dead girl, and sister and two friends.
