FIRST SESSION OF FARMER-LABOR PARLIAMENT COMES TO AN END

Many Bouquets Flung in Dying Hours—Sitting Ended At Midnight—Prorogation Set For Friday Next—Drury Election Act and Carmichael Power Act Passed.

TORONTO, May 28.—The first session of the first Farmer-Labor Parliament of the province of Ontario was concluded at midnight tonight. The dying hours of the session had nothing of gloom in them; instead there was an air of general joyfulness, and all hands joined in saying nice things about the session. From Drury's expressed gratitude at the manner in which his inexperienced cabinet had been treated by the House, and Hon. Manning declared that the session had been a success in every respect. The members generally seemed pleased, and all departed from the Parliament Buildings in apparent good humor. Prorogation will take place Friday, June 4.

Features of the last day of the session were the bowling out of the re-modelled McCrear bill dealing with street railways, and the killing of a street railway bill, introduced today by Louis Col. Price (Parkdale), to prevent the changing or extension of a street railway franchise without a vote of the people taken on the matter.

Measures Passed. A number of measures were passed at the final session of the House. Premier Drury's bill providing for additional indemnity for recognized opposition leaders was amended to provide \$5,000 for the year ending October 31, which is to be divided between Mr. H. Dewar, leader of the Liberals, and Mr. Howard Ferguson, Conservative leader, and thereafter of an Opposition party of fifteen is to receive \$1,500 per annum.

Premier Drury's election act which also passed tonight, provides for the use of municipal lists on elections, and the enumeration system is abandoned. Annual checking is done away with, but a complete revision will be made before general election. Polling hours are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., with polls opening at 6 a.m. where there is particular need.

Restricts Power Firm. An act introduced by Col. Carmichael restricts every power company drawing water from Niagara to its use in the city under penalty of loss of their privileges. The province, when the new works are completed, will reach the limit it is allowed to use under the agreement with the United States.

Bills were also passed giving the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission power to construct steam reserves and laying down the provisions under which the commission may purchase and build radial lines.

The Legislature also passed an act permitting the export of pulpwood from Ontario in limited quantities to be under control of the cabinet instead of a minister. Premier Drury stated that there were areas in the province too distant from Canadian mills and markets to make it profitable to use them, but from which pulpwood can be advantageously sold for export. The utmost care is promised in carrying out the provisions of the bill.

NEW SITE SECURED FOR SANATORIUM TO REPLACE ONE BURNED

Proposal To Ask Contribution of \$1 From Essex Citizens.

WINDSOR, May 28.—Announcement was made today that the Essex Hospital Association had acquired \$30,000, a large site with a frontage of 400 feet on Prince road, on the outskirts of Windsor, for the erection of a new sanatorium to replace the one recently destroyed by fire at Union-on-the-Lake, near Kingsville.

The property is situated within a quarter of a mile of the Essex Golf and Country Club, and has facilities for both a water supply and sewer connections. A campaign is now under way to raise the necessary funds for the construction of the building. It will be based on an appeal to each person in the county to contribute \$1. It is estimated there are 100,000 people in Essex County.

COMMISSION NAMED TO INVESTIGATE THE BERGERON SHOOTING

Judge Wallace of Woodstock Appointed Member of Commission.

WOODSTOCK, May 28.—Judge Wallace, this city, has received word of his appointment as a commissioner by the Ontario Government to inquire into the shooting of Ernest Bergeron by certain constables on April 5 in the Township of Sandwich west, County of Essex. On that occasion Bergeron, alleged he was shot by officers in search of bootleggers. The investigation will open in Windsor on June 2.

GROGERS AND BUTCHERS IN RAILWAY CITY TO CLOSE EARLY SATURDAYS

Air Pictures of St. Thomas Taken For Commercial Purposes.

ST. THOMAS, May 28.—As an incentive to the other businessmen in the city to give their assistants and other employees a more agreeable time of shutting up shops at the end of the week, the grocers and butchers have come to a mutual agreement to close their stores at 10 o'clock on Saturday nights, and at 6:30 p.m. on other evenings. The drygoods and department stores now allow their clerks to leave at 10 o'clock on the week-end nights.

EFFORT TO OVERRIDE WILSON VETO FAILS

WASHINGTON, May 28.—An effort to override President Wilson's veto of the Republican peace resolution failed today in the House.

The vote was 219 in favor of overriding the veto, 152 against, or 29 less than the required two-thirds majority.

DOHERTY INTRODUCES AMENDMENTS TO CRIMINAL CODE GOVERNING RACING.

TO INSPECT MACHINES

Government Officials To Supervise Operation of Pari-Mutual Systems.

OTTAWA, May 28.—(Canadian Press)—Profits of racing associations are limited according to the amount bet on each race, by a provision of amendments to the criminal code, introduced in the Commons this afternoon by Hon. C. J. Doherty.

These amendments provide that betting shall be by the pari-mutual system only, and that profits of race track owners shall be limited to 7 per cent of the amount bet on each race, where that amount is over \$20,000. On all amounts over \$20,000 and under \$30,000, the percentage is restricted to 6 per cent. On amounts over \$30,000 and under \$40,000, to 5 per cent.

Total Amount Bet. Over \$40,000 and up to \$50,000, 4 per cent, and all amounts over \$50,000, 3 per cent. In each case the percentage of the racing club or association is to be gauged by the total amount of money bet on the race by the pari-mutual system. There is also a change in regard to the "break," which the association is allowed to retain. Provision is made for the racing association to retain the odds which are less than any multiple of five cents. Pari-mutual machines operated under the new amendments are to be inspected, approved and operated under the supervision of government officials, appointed by the department of agriculture. There will be an appeal at each track to see that no bets are accepted after the horses go to the post in each race, when the machines must be locked, and in that way it is aimed to check any attempt at fraud. Racing associations are to pay the cost of such supervision.

Number of Days. All the present conditions regarding the operation of betting on race tracks, with regard to the number of days of racing, etc., are continued in force, and the provision that pari-mutual alone shall be used, and that profits shall be restricted as above are added to the present regulations.

No definite date is set for the bill coming into effect, but it is anticipated that it will be law immediately on receiving the royal assent.

SAM HUGHES TO TRY TO DISCUSS IRISH QUESTION

Moves Resolution To Haul Problem Into House At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 28.—(Canadian Press)—The Irish question, with its relation to the United States and also to the negro problem in the United States of America, is to come before the House of Commons in a resolution moved by Sir Sam Hughes, former minister of militia.

The resolution claims that laws concerning the Irish tenantry are more liberal, relatively, towards the tenant than those of any other part of the British Empire, or any other country. It says Irish troubles have been fomented largely by Sinn Fein landlords and others in the United States, a country where there have been more Irish tenants evicted for non-payment of rent and other cause every month for the last 24 years, than have been recorded in Ireland for the same period.

The resolution urges educative steps should be taken before proper authorities in conformity with international law as may lead to the overthrow of brutal Irish-American landlordism in the United States of America and also for the upbuilding and securing of fair treatment for the down-trodden Irish tenantry in the large American cities.

And it is further resolved that some effective means should be taken to educate the citizens of the United States of America and especially certain members of the United States Congress to study their home concerns with a view to mitigating the horrible situation concerning the negro problem and such other problems requiring attention in that country.

NO ACTION TAKEN. INGESTERS, May 28.—Two petitions, one in favor of daylight saving, and one in opposition, the latter supported by a deputation, were presented to the town council tonight at a special meeting. The council decided to take no action, preferring to leave the matter to the individual discretion of the citizens.
