MIGRATORY BIRDS ARE PROTECTED BY **NEW REGULATIONS**

Methods of Shooting Are Restricted by Changes in Act.

New regulations under the migratory birds convention act have just been issued by the federal department of the interior, and involve important changes. At present, under Ontario regulations, no person is allowed to kill in one season in excess of 200 ducks. Under the new regulations issued by the department of the interior daily bag limits are imposed in various provinces, including Ontario and Quebec, as follows:

Ducks, 25 in aggregate of all kinds;
geese, 15; brant, 15; rails, coots, gallinules, 26; black-bellied and golden ploverz and great and lesser yellow-legs.
16; Wilson snipe or jack-snipe, 25;
woodcock, 10; doves, 25.
Restrictions for Dominion.
The following shooting restrictions
are imposed throughout all Canada.
No person shall kill or attempt to kyl
any migratory game birds during the
open season, except with a gun not
larger than No, 10 gauge.
No person shall kill or attempt to kill
any migratory game birds by the use
of any automatic, swivel or machine
gun or battery, or by the use of an
aeroplane, power boat, sall boat or
sunken boat.
No person shall kill or attempt to kill
any migratory game bird between the
bours of supset and surrise.

No person shall kill or attempt to kill any migratory game bird between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

No person shall kill or attempt to kill from any motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle any migratory game bird.

New Regulations.

There is practically no change in the regulations for scientific permits, but important new regulations are passed regarding the propagation of migratory birds for the purpose of keeping tab upon and controlling the propagation of migratory birds in captivity, whether to be used for food, ornamental or zoo-

logical purposes, etc.

Taxidermists have to register in future and secure a license at a fee of \$1.

One change has been made in the open One change has been made in the open season in Ontario. Wilson or jack-snipe open season has been extended, and is now the same as Quebec, and the sea-sons for certain shore birds, September 1 to December 14, instead of October 15 to November 14, as formerly. Wood-cock in Ontario remains at the short

season named.

Bag limits for the Maritime Provinces are: 25 ducks per day aggregate, 15 geese, 15 brant, 25 rails, coots and gallinules, 15 plovers or yellow-legs, 25 mipe, 10 woodcock and 25 doves. The season's duck limit is 200.


