RAILWAY COMMISSION REACHING DECISIONS

Judgment in Telegraph Rates
Case Expected—To Draft New Live Stock Contract Also.

RUTHERFORD IS BUSY

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Two important matters are at present before the railway commission for decision. The judgment in the telegraph rates case, which is of country-wide interest, will probably be forthcoming before long. The drafting of a new live stock contract must also be undertaken by the board following the sitting here which recently concluded. Commissioners Rutherford, the member of the railway commission who is most conversant with live stock problems, is very busy at present. He is preparing the report on horse racing and race track gambling for submission to the government, and he is chairman of the commission which is investigating the possibilities of railway and truck development in the north.

"Times" Says Canadian Did Not Denounce United States

London, Feb. 14.—The Times today prints the following under the heading of "Lord Grey's Letter": "An article appeared in our issue of the fifth instant under the heading of 'Political Notes, Lord Grey's Letter', in which we referred to the outrageous denunciations of the United States in a weekly journal which is reputed to be controlled by a Canadian-born Unionist member of parliament, Messrs. Bull and Bull, solicitors for Col. Grant Morden, M.P. for Chiswick, assure us that their client did not inspire the article referred to in any way, nor does he control the political view or policy of the paper in question."

CHICAGO WOMEN CELEBRATE VICTORY

Battle for Equal Voice in Gov-ernment Triumphantly Con-cluded Saturday.

SUFFRAGISTS CONFIDENT

Chicago, Feb. 14.—Victory in wom-an's battle for an equal voice in gov-ernment—fought for 81 years—will be proclaimed tonight by 2,400 women suffragists and with their proclama-tion the National American Woman Suffrage Association will, to all ef-fects, be victorious. The women are rising up from their seats, will be the league of women voters, which to-morrow takes up the task of teaching women how to use the vote. Suff-fragists are confident that the necessary ratifications will be forthcoming within a few days. As this morning's session of the suffrage association reports, were presented on the hospital work conducted by the association in France since the spring of 1917.

"REGIMENTAL FARMS" FOR LANCASHIRE MEN

Preston, Feb. 15.—The Lancashire County Council has formulated a com-prehensive scheme for the settlement of demobilized men on the land. Regimental farms are being prepar-ed, and each Lancashire regiment will have a farm worked by its ex-mem-bers in proportion to one man for every ten acres.

Hungary Granted Eight Days To Agree to Allied Treaty

Paris, Feb. 14.—Hungary has been granted a delay of eight days by the supreme allied council in which to agree to the treaty with the allies, says The Matin, which asserts an allied power is inclined to make to the government in question, in the terms of the pact.
