EVELYN'S SUIT POSTPONED.
New York, May 11.—A hearing on Evelyn Nesbit Thaw's suit for the annulment of her marriage to Harry K. Thaw was scheduled to begin in this city today, but was postponed by agreement of counsel.

Daniel O'Reilly, counsel for Mrs. Thaw, requested a postponement on the ground that he had been unable to secure certain evidence which he

desired from Pittsburgh. A commissioner to take the testimony was appointed recently by Robert E. Deyo, the referee appointed to take the evidence in the Thaw case. Counsel for Thaw consented to the postponement, but declared that he would agree to no further delays. The new date of the opening of the hearing has not been fixed.

An Alleged Case of Horse Stealing

A warrant was issued this morning against Ernest Poole by William Patterson, who charges Poole with stealing a horse belonging to him. According to Mr. Patterson he had bought the horse from Poole, and paid him \$46 for it. Patterson says he sold the horse to Oley Johnston, of London Township, who took it home and put it in his barn. About 2 o'clock on Thursday morning, it is alleged that Poole went to Johnston's barn and took the horse away. Poole has not as yet paid his livery license, he having been convicted a few days ago of keeping a livery stable without a license, and a warrant was ordered for his arrest.

Tuberculosis Exhibit in the City Hall

The tuberculosis exhibit opened this morning at the city hall with a large attendance. As soon as the doors were opened at 9 o'clock large crowds of people kept coming continually. Ald. Stewart has a large staff of officers in charge, and they do their best to make the visitor appreciate the exhibit. The exhibit will be open all day. There is no admission. No person can well afford to miss the exhibit, as its educational value is very great. This evening a public meeting will be held in the city hall, in connection with the exhibit. His Lordship Bishop Williams will preside. Addresses will be delivered by Dr. W. H. Moorhouse on "The Prevention of Tuberculosis," and by Dr. John D. Wilson on "The Necessity of a Tuberculosis Hospital in London." These lectures will be illustrated by stereopticon views. The exhibit will last until Friday, and will be open afternoon and evening.

Liberal Convention at Mt. Brydges

Great interest is being shown in the Liberal convention to be held in Mount Brydges on Thursday next at 11 o'clock. From every part of the riding the most encouraging reports have come, and the convention promises to be one of the best ever held in the riding.

A number of prominent Liberals will allow their names to go to the convention, prominent among them being Mr. T. G. Turnbull, reeve of Lobo; Mr. J. C. Elliott, of Glencoe; Mr. J. F. Lethbridge, of Caradoc, and others.

In the ruins of the Guinness home, Louis Schultze, who was employed by the sheriff to sluice the ashes in the cellar, completed his apparatus early and began work.

Additional evidence regarding the methods by which the persons whose corpses were found on the Guinness farm met death was unearthed this morning. Almost two dozen pairs of scissors, bent and curved in the fashion of surgical instruments, are said to have been found in the ashes in the cellar, and in addition, three knives, two of a surgical character, and another an unmistakable dirk, were picked up. It is believed by some that the dirk may have been the chief weapon employed in the series of murders, but the fact that there was no mark of penetrating wounds on Andrew Holcain's body is a possible refutation of this theory.

Wore a Belt of Knives.
Chloroform or some other deadly drug is thought to have been used to compass his death. In all the other bodies on the farm there is no negative evidence to disprove the dirk theory, although the condition of the cadavers precludes definite information on this point. The knives and scissors are thought to have been used in dismembering the bodies. Mrs. C. O. Papham, of Laporte, who for six years was a neighbor of Mrs. Guinness, says that on the only occasion on which she called upon her a strong breeze coming through an open window blew aside the folds of a loose house dress which Mrs. Guinness was wearing and she called aloud her body was wide belt containing pouches of various sizes, and sheaths which seemed to have been constructed for knives. There is a possibility that the grand jury, which convened here yesterday, will begin consideration of the charges against Ray Lamphere today.

DEATH OF JOHN TEMPLIN
One of Fergus' Most Prominent Business Men Passes Away.
Fergus, May 12.—Mr. John Templin, carriage builder, and senior member of the Templin Manufacturing Company, died suddenly last night of heart failure. He was one of the oldest residents and best known business men in town. A widow, two daughters, Mrs. Wm. Barnett, of Lively Springs, and Miss A. Templin, proprietor of the Fergus News-Record; G. C. Templin, of the above firm, residing here, and F. W. Templin, of the general store of Templin & McDonald, of Kincardine, survive. The funeral will be held on Thursday, at 2 o'clock.

A WILL CASE.
Toronto, May 11.—Chief Justice Falconbridge gave judgment this morning construing a clause of the will of the late Catherine Ann Merriek of Uxbridge. She left an estate to be divided equally among her children, but in another clause said she left nothing to her daughter Catherine. The latter was already provided for. Catherine claimed to rank on the estate in virtue of the first clause of the will, and the judge upheld this contention.

YARMOUTH FOLK ROW OVER SCHOOLS

Eastern and Western Sections Divide as to the New Site.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

St. Thomas, May 12.—There is war on between the eastern and western divisions of School Section No. 18, Yarmouth. In this section there are three schoolhouses. One is located just at the city limits of St. Thomas, and at a recent meeting the trustees met and decided to build a new \$4,500 school. To this the eastern section strenuously objected, and insists that a new central school be built on the site of the old school a mile further east. Last night a mass meeting of about 200 farmers was held at the eastern school to discuss the question and it was a warm session. The western contingent characterized the men of the east as "thickheads," and refused to entertain the idea of a central school. A vote was taken, resulting in 91 in favor of a central school and 76 against. Instantly pandemonium was let loose. There were charges of impersonation, fraud, and all the practices known to corrupt elections. The western people declare they will go ahead and build their new schoolhouse, and incorporate Yarmouth Heights as a village, and the eastern people may do as they please.
