ASSISTANT CHIEF OF IMMIGRATION HERE

G. Blake Robertson, assistant superintendent of the Dominion immigration department, is at the Royal Hotel on a tour of inspection of the different ports. He was at Halifax when the latest lot of immigrants, landed in Canada under the auspices of the Salvation Army, arrived and he expressed himself as more than pleased at the appearance of them.

Mr. Robertson will be here for a couple of days and will then go back to Ottawa. He commented on the marvelous growth of immigration to Canada during the last five years, both from Britain and Europe. Five years ago the number was only a little more than 40,000, and during the present year it is expected that no fewer than 160,000 new Canadians will reach the shores.

The influx of United States settlers into the west is also increasing. A conservative estimate, Mr. Robertson thought, would place the number who would cross the international boundary this year at 55,000.
