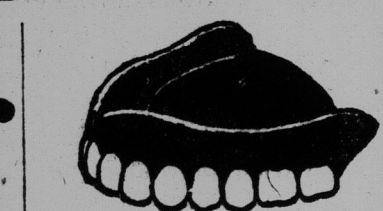

LATE LOCALS

Steamship Tunisian will sail tomorrow morning for Liverpool direct.

C. P. R. steamship Lake Champlain, now on her way to Liverpool, took away a cargo valued at \$230,206.

Registrar Jones reports five marriages during the present week, also nine births, four male and four female.

A number of the policemen have put on the white summer helmet today in preference to the heavy winter cap.

Steamship Orinoco, Captain Bale, arrived this morning from Bermuda, via Halifax. All the passengers were landed at Halifax.

Twelve burial permits were issued by the board of health authorities for the past week, as follows: Pneumonia, two; mania, diabetes, consumption, heart disease, Bright's disease, acute meningitis, spinal meningitis, inflammation of brain, inflammation of kidney and accidental drowning, one each.

The board of health will continue its offer of free vaccination for all who desire it and the rooms on Princess street will be open this afternoon and evening for this purpose. Last Saturday only one individual took advantage of the opportunity, so Dr. Pratt had a very easy time of it.

A few years ago the Y. M. C. A. held a meeting for boys at 400 boys were present. They have arranged a similar meeting for tomorrow afternoon in the Leinster street Baptist church, at four o'clock, with an address by the Rev. L. A. McLean. A very large orchestra, led by Morton L. Harrison will supply the music, and until 4:15 there will be a musical service, followed by the address. It is confidently hoped that there will be as many or more boys present tomorrow than at the previous meeting.

St. George's Society will have their annual service tomorrow evening at Trinity church at 7 o'clock. The Rt. Rev. J. A. Richardson, bishop coadjutor, will preach and there will be special hymns, among which the Te Deum is one, composed especially for St. George's Day, and used last year in England. A large attendance of members is looked for. The prayers, &c. will be intoned by Rev. E. Revington-Jones.

MONTREAL HAS ANOTHER FIRE

Quintal Fils & Co.'s Wholesale Grocery House Gutted This Morning—\$100,000 Damage Done.

MONTREAL, April 20 (Special).—The firemen had another big fire on their hands early this morning. The wholesale grocery house of Quintal Fils & Co. was gutted and the loss will be upwards of \$100,000. The firm occupies a large five story stone structure on St. Paul street. The fire started about four o'clock. The brigade succeeded in confining the fire to the place of origin, but not before a hard struggle. The stock is a complete loss, and it is stated it is fully covered by insurance.

TONIGHT'S MEETING

Requisition Will be Presented to Hon. Wm. Pugsley Tonight at Gathering in Berryman's Hall.

A large gathering is looked for in Berryman's hall tonight when, at 8 o'clock, there will be a meeting of the electors available to Hon. Wm. Pugsley being chosen as the candidate for the St. John city and county seat in the house of commons, made vacant by Dr. Stockton's death.

The meeting will be opened at 8 o'clock and an interesting feature will be the presentation of a very largely signed requisition asking Mr. Pugsley to accept nomination.

ST. JOHN'S INTERESTS

To the Editor of the Times:
Sir—It is a good thing to see the interest the people of St. John are taking in the coming by-election for the Dominion Parliament. It goes to show that they are aroused to the necessity of obtaining a strong man to represent their interests in this important assembly. St. John has suffered in the past by electing second-rate men to represent them at Ottawa.

When citizens are asked to sign a requisition for anyone for sympathetic or purely political reasons they should stand aside and consider the different position St. John occupied at Ottawa when represented by such a man as Mr. Blair as compared with the present representation. The late Mr. Blair had the ability and influence to obtain proper recognition for claims of the city, and we are today reap- ing the reward of his labors in additional dredging for the west side and of the harbor approaches. It was he who made the claims of St. John known, and whose forceful support of these claims in the executive government and in parliament has brought the grants that were absolutely necessary to permit St. John to provide facilities for the rapidly increasing winter trade. If the people of St. John do not realize that they should that without federal aid the resources of the city were insufficient to provide the additional wharf accommodation necessary for the growing trade of the port.

This trade will grow and expand with the development of the western country, and with the increased transportation facilities afforded by the construction of two new trans-continental lines, to such an extent and so rapidly that St. John, out of its own resources, cannot possibly provide the accommodation the trade must have. A comprehensive scheme of harbor improvement must be devised, federal assistance must be obtained or the growth of the city started up after twenty years of stagnation will cease and we will again come to a standstill. With this in view it will be admitted that we require the services of the ablest man we can have. That the people desire such a man is proven by the numbers who have signed Premier Pugsley's requisition. He is the one man who can fill the bill and ought to receive the unanimous support of the whole people of the city irrespective of political affiliations. Should he decide to allow his name to go before the nominating convention of the Liberal party there should be no opposition and it would be a wise and patriotic move on the part of the Conservative party to withhold opposition at the present time, thereby saying to the rest of Canada that the people of St. John by unanimous consent have sent to Ottawa their best man in order that the claims of this city and port for recognition as the first Canadian winter port may be fully set forth.
