A. A. Barnes, of Hampton, has received information from the auditor general, Canadian Militia, Ottawa, concerning his son, Lieutenant Otty Barnes, of the 26th Battalion. The information is to the effect that Lieutenant Barnes was last seen shooting Germans and saving his men forward. It is believed that he was wounded and made prisoner during a daring raid on the enemy in January.

J.H. FRINK LEADS CANADIAN CLUB

At a meeting of the Canadian Club, which was held last evening at Bond's, the annual election of officers took place. James H. Frink was elected president, succeeding Mayor R. T. Hayes. Rev. Capt. G. A. Kubring delivered an interesting address, the subject of which was "The Sacrifice Already Justified in Spiritual and Material Results." Reports were also received.

The nominating committee, of which M. E. Agar was the chairman, recommended the following slate of officers, which was elected by acclamation: James H. Frink, president; Judge H. O. McInerney, first vice-president; Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, second vice-president; C. W. Romans, secretary; H. A. Porter, treasurer, and W. J. S. Myles, literary correspondent. A. H. Wetmore, William Brodie, A. M. Belding and Robert O'Brien were named a finance committee, and F. T. Barbour, Sheriff A. A. Wilson, C. B. Lockhart and James Jack as additional members of the executive.

After Mr. Frink had been seated in office he appointed T. H. Sommerville and F. A. Dykeman as an auditing committee. Mayor Hayes presided at the opening of the meeting, submitted his own report as president and introduced the speaker of the evening, A. H. Wetmore, the retiring secretary, read his brief report, and H. A. Porter, who was re-elected treasurer, showed by his statement of finances that the club was in very good condition financially.

MAJOR-GEN CARSON RETURNING TO CANADA

Rumor Says He May Seek Nomination, to Present His Military Views

Ottawa, April 25.—Major-General John Carson of Montreal, who up to the time of Sir Sam Hughes' retirement from the militia administration, acted as the minister's representative in England and chief executive officer of the overseas forces, is to return to Canada.

It is understood that Gen. Carson has had considerable friction with the new dispensation, and it is reported that he will seek an opportunity of presenting his views on militia administration by taking an active part in the coming federal election. He may seek nomination for a Montreal constituency.
