### COBHAM FAILS TO FLY PLANE FROM STEAMER

Ground Swell Too Strong And Tug Tows Aircraft

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Failure marked the attempt today of Sir Alan Cobham, British aviator and lecturer, who arrived on the liner Homeric, to fly a "moth" plane from Quarantine to the Battery, to prove that mails could thus be expedited.

The only time that the small plane soared in the air was when it was hoisted from the after deck of the Homeric to the water below. After being buffeted by ground swells, the "moth" was finally towed to the Battery and later to Miller's Field, Staten Island.

Sir Alan and Lady Cobham boarded the plane on the ship and were hoisted over the port side without incident. The plane was steered by guide ropes controlled from the ship, while the wings were unfolded and fastened in their proper position.

Two officers of the Homeric stood on the pontoons during the hoisting and lowering, but after one of them had been removed it was discovered that there was no arrangement to take off the man who was to have cranked or turned over the propeller.

The ground swell by that time was too strong to permit a safe take-off from the water. The problem of getting the "moth" to the Battery was solved by having a tug tow the plane.

Colonel Orestes Ferrara, new Cuban ambassador to the United States, and his wife will occupy a prominent place in the social life of Washington. Colonel Ferrara is the Liberal leader and former Speaker of the Cuban House of Representatives.

Meanwhile the Homeric had passed the Battery and a marine police boat was dispatched to search for the plane, as the rumor spread that the occupants were lost. The police boat discovered the plane unoccupied and found Sir Alan and Lady Cobham aboard the tug.

Members of the Aeronautical Society of America greeted them at the Battery, hailing the British aviator as a pioneer.

Many passengers on the Homeric voiced indignation that they had missed their trains and Thanksgiving dinners due to the ship's three-hour delay in docking to enable Sir Alan to make his attempt.

### NEW INDUSTRY FOR MILL AT GAGETOWN

Machinery For Barrel-Making Installed to Serve Orchardists

GAGETOWN, Nov. 25.—A new industry was started here this summer by Donald A. Adamson, in connection with his grist mill. This is the installation of machinery for the manufacture of barrels, in which Mr. Adamson has already done a good business.

Here, on the river, whetted apples and other produce are grown extensively, this factory with the river steamers as a handy means of transportation should prove particularly advantageous to local buyers.

### SACKVILLE MAN IS LIKELY DROWNED

Albert Tower Believed to Have Slipped Off Deck of Schooner

HOPEWELL HILL, Nov. 25.—Albert Tower, of Sackville, cook of the three-masted schooner William N. Reinhardt, now lying lumber-laden at the Bonny River Lumber Company's wharf at Albert, is presumed to have drowned last night by falling over the side of the vessel into the swiftly running tide of the Shepody River while he was carrying a basket of dishes from the cabin to the galley in the darkness. The body had not been recovered this afternoon.

No one witnessed the accident but his disappearance and broken dishes on the vessel's rail pointed to a fatality.

### LIKELY OFF DECKLOAD.

Captain Burnham Tower said today that the cook left the cabin to take his basket of dishes to the galley to wash, between 6 and 7 o'clock in the evening. As he failed to return the captain sent a man forward to look for him but it was found he had evidently not reached the galley. Further search revealed the broken dishes on the rail. The night was very dark and rainy and it is supposed the unfortunate man while walking over the deckload got too near the side and fell over.

### SEARCH CONTINUES.

Search is being continued for the body but it is quite possible it was carried out to sea, the tide at the time being on the ebb.

Tower was 67 years of age and leaves his wife and one son and five daughters. He was a brother-in-law of the captain who is deeply affected by the occurrence.

### CORRUPTION CHARGES AIMED AT GOULD MAKE MAINE CONTEST WARM

Investigation Into Primary Expenses Demanded by Democrats and New Brunswick Probe Figure in U. S. Senatorial Election

AUGUSTA, Maine, Nov. 25.—With Republican control of the next Senate depending on the outcome of a special election in this State next Monday, Maine's political apple cart was turned bottom up last Sunday by a broadside of corruption charges aimed at Arthur R. Gould, Republican Senatorial nominee in the special primary of November 1.

Pulton J. Redman, Gould's Democratic opponent, opened fire with a public statement in which he charged Gould with having given a \$100,000 bribe several years ago.

### ACCUSED BY PASTOR.

Previously Rev. A. F. Leigh, of Randolph, filed charges with the Secretary of State here that Gould had exceeded the legal limit of \$1,500 in his primary campaign expenditures, while a group of Maine Democrats asked Senator James A. Reed of the Senate campaign funds investigating committee to inaugurate a federal inquiry into the Maine primary situation.

Reidman's charges were contained in a statement issued by a committee associated with his campaign. The statement took the form of a report and review of an investigation conducted by Chief Justice H. A. McKown in New Brunswick in 1918.

Gould declared the "bribe story" was "old" and asserted that the money had been paid by former business associates in a railroad construction project without his knowledge.

### HEARING SET FOR FRIDAY.

Meanwhile Secretary of State Frank Ball set tomorrow as the date for a hearing on the Rev. Leigh's charges. The Randolph clergyman is prominent in the Ku Klux Klan organization of Maine, which was reported to have been actively opposed to Gould's candidacy.

Gould demanded detailed specifications of the campaign expenditure charges and Mr. Leigh responded last night by filing specifications covering political advertisements, conveyances for carrying voters to the polls, payment of unknown amounts to political workers and others as well as purchase of campaign buttons and banners, all of which were paid for by Gould.

Rev. Leigh further charged that the campaign conducted by Gould could not have been run on the \$1,500 expense account the candidate filed after the primary.
