

SCHOOL TAX IN LANCASTER IS 3 CENTS LOWER

Board Votes \$13,500 for Year's Expenses; Rate is \$1.00

EAST SAINT JOHN HAS BOND ISSUE

Further Accommodation Demanded by Growth—Rothsay Meeting

A reduction of three cents in the dollar in the assessment rate is called for in the warrant asked at the annual school meeting of Lancaster district No. 2 last night. The trustees recommended that warrants be issued for \$13,500, thus reducing the assessment rate to \$1.

The meeting was held in No. 1 building and was called to order by J. J. Hennessy, councillor William Golding was elected chairman for the meeting. There was one of the largest attendance of ratepayers in several years.

H. M. Stout, secretary of the board of trustees, read the annual report. This showed receipts as follows: County grants, \$1,088.79; tax receipts, \$13,500.44; other sources, \$71.90. The expenditures were as follows: Salaries, \$8,083.00; general, \$3,140.96; buildings, \$80.78; interest on bonds, \$44.44; fuel, \$1,032.67. There was a balance on hand of \$387.81.

SINKING FUND.

It was also reported that the sinking fund contained \$3,033.76 and there was a savings account at the bank of \$3,822.97.

The trustees recommended that warrants be issued for \$13,500 for the coming year, thus reducing the tax rate three cents in the dollar to a rate of \$1. Several of the ratepayers present spoke of the creditable showing made by the trustees and expressed their appreciation of the reduced tax rate.

Harper Henderson was elected to the board to take the place of Simpson Bradshaw, retired. Rev. C. T. Clark spoke of the good work done by Mr. Bradshaw and moved that a record of his service be placed in the minutes.

The scrutineers for the election were Charles R. Nelson, Robert Carrier and W. Verley Barnhill.

EAST SAINT JOHN

At the annual meeting of the ratepayers of the East Saint John school held at the school last evening estimates requiring \$13,500 for the coming year were passed and the meeting adjourned.

The trustees, to issue bonds to the value of \$15,000 to provide for further accommodation for pupils at the East Saint John school. This latter move was occasioned by the steadily increasing population of this part of the county. It has been found necessary to engage an extra teacher for the coming term, the expense for this being included in the estimates passed by the meeting last night.

The matter of providing water for the Little River school, arranged for by a committee last year, came in for discussion. When the ratepayers had agreed to this last year they were of the opinion that the total cost would not amount to more than \$200 at the utmost. Since that time they were presented with a bill for \$732. Although this bill has been settled there were some at last evening's meeting who thought the bill exorbitant and expressed their opinions accordingly.

CONDITIONS AT SCHOOL.

Another matter that was discussed ardently was the disagreeable condition of the atmosphere at the Little River school. The fertilizing plant in that vicinity is alleged to have made the air redolent with the odor of their product. Two years ago a committee had been appointed by the ratepayers to

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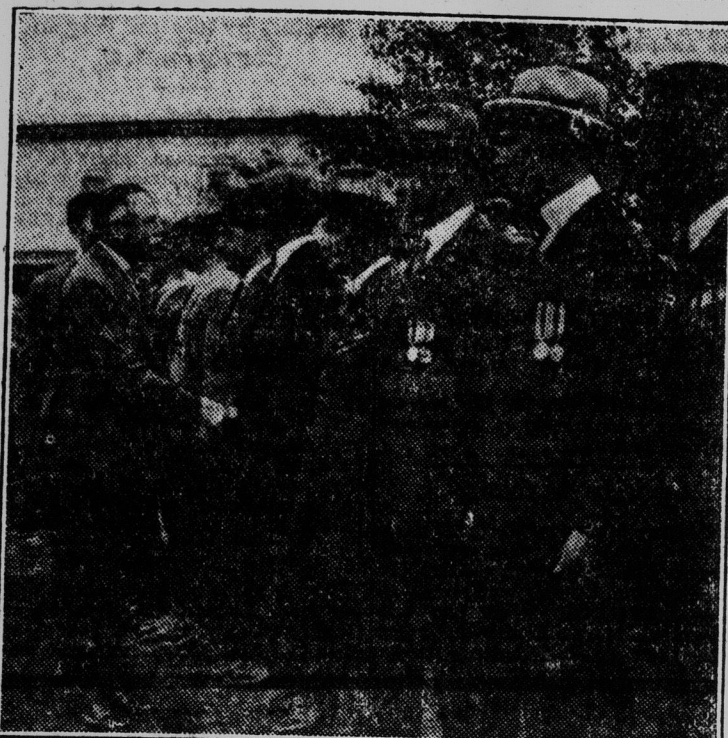
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Haig Meets Northern Veterans

LOWER LETTER RATE TO B. WEST INDIES

Three Cents an Ounce is New Arrangement—Special Parcel Post Plans.

OTTAWA, July 13.—Hon. Charles Murphy, postmaster general, announced that the rate on letters to the British West Indies has been reduced to three cents for a one-ounce letter and two cents for each subsequent ounce, effective July 1. This is the rate which applies within Canada itself, and to the United States and Mexico.

AREAS AFFECTED.

The new rate applies to letters to Bermuda, St. Kitts, Antigua, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, Barbados, St. Vincent, Grenada, Trinidad, Bahamas and Jamaica, British Guiana and British Honduras.

Mr. Murphy also recently concluded special parcel post conventions with St. Vincent and Grenada which provides, among other things, for the insurance of parcel post to these places.

MARKETS NEEDED FOR MARITIME FISH

Should Now be Able to Compete With Pacific, Says A. H. Brittain.

MONTREAL, July 13.—According to A. H. Brittain, of the Maritime Fish Corporation, who has just returned from the Canadian Fisheries Convention at Halifax, production is not the problem that faces the industry, which, he declared, must find more extensive markets. He expressed the opinion that with modern transportation facilities it should now be possible for fish from the Nova Scotia fisheries to find a market as far west as Winnipeg. "Far enough West to compete with fish from the Pacific," Fisheries around the Maritime Provinces were described by Mr. Brittain as "exhaustible." He told of an announcement that greatly interested the convention—that Canadian fish could be feasibly shipped to the British market, one of the largest fish consuming markets in the world.

Moncton To Determine Cost of Revaluation

MONCTON, July 13.—At a meeting of the City Council this evening it was decided to take steps to ascertain the cost of making an independent revaluation of real estate in Moncton. It was also decided to collect a poll tax of \$6 from each applicant for a city registration card, except in cases of those who have already paid a poll tax in another community.

TO SEND NO TROOPS

LONDON, July 13.—Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain, the foreign secretary announced in the House of Commons today that the British government does not propose to send troops to Tangier, Morocco.

CHOSEN CANDIDATES.

Charles H. Elliott, barrister, of Perth, and Anders J. Jensen, of New Denmark, general merchant and warden of the county, were chosen as the Opposition candidates in the coming provincial election. Two other names were voted on, those of Joseph J. Cote, of Grand Falls, and Thos. Marsden Plaster Rock. Both the candidates made addresses thanking the delegates, who were there from all parts of the county, and promising to do all in their power to aid the party.

Dr. Baxter, in his address to the delegates, said that with the convention next week in Northumberland, the Conservative ticket in the province would be complete. The fact that the Liberals had still four or five conventions to hold he viewed as a sign of weakness in the party and asserted that he saw evidence of friction among the Government forces.

RAPS ENFORCEMENT.

The Premier, he declared, had tried to link his name with past political scandals in New Brunswick. He asserted that his name had been cleared, and went on to say that the greatest scandal in the history of the province was the manner in which the Veniot Government failed to enforce the prohibition liquor law of the province. It seemed strange to him, he said, that contracts were sometimes awarded by the Government on a margin of \$15 or \$20; that might give rise to suspicions, he declared.

Govt. Candidates Visit St. Martins

ST. MARTINS, July 13.—The Government candidates for Saint John county, Dr. Curren and W. A. Ross, paid a second visit to St. Martins Saturday and met a number of their friends Saturday evening.

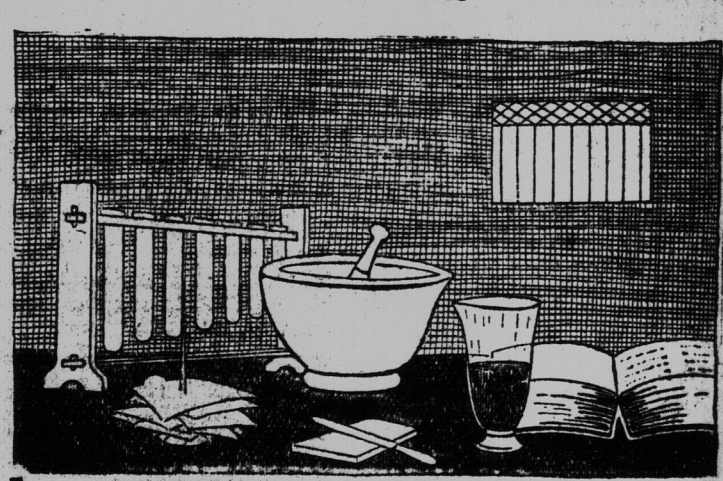
