Shoots 3 At Movie And Causes a Panic

Boisterous Man, Ejected From Chicago, Theatre, Returns and Fires at Spectators.

Chicago, June 2.—Three patrons were shot and several hundred persons attending the National Moving Picture Theatre, 608 South State street, stampeded for the exits when a boisterous spectator, who had been ejected because of his offensive remarks, returned and rained the audience with a 22 calibre revolver. The wielder of the weapon then darted away and lost himself in the crowds before the police could capture him.

The gun toter had occupied a seat near the front of the house and had been warned several times because of remarks made loud enough for persons about him to hear. Finally, Samuel Isaacson one of the movie operators, ordered the man to leave. He placed his hand on the man's arm but the man shook him off.

"Keep your hands off me," he shouted belligerently, then added sullenly, "I'll go out but you ain't going to throw me out."

Isaacson escorted the man through the doors used ordinarily as the entrance. In another instant the man had pushed his way in again through the exit doors. He had the revolver in his hand and aimed it point blank at Isaacson. The weapon missed firing Isaacson just time enough before the man pulled the trigger a second time to make a headlong dive between two rows of seats.

Then the bullets began flying in all directions. Women screamed, men tried to crawl under the seats. Some jammed their way through a narrow exit under the stage. Then as the gunman emptied his revolver and jumped
