


tion of the Merchants' Bank of Canada by the Bank of Montreal there passes away a financial institution founded in 1861, whose progress marked the steps in the growth of Canada. Sir Hugh Allan is its last president. The beginning of the bank was humble, as compared with present day figures. The authorized capital was \$2,000,000, and provision was made that business would commence when \$400,000 had been subscribed and \$100,000 paid up. This did not occur till 1864. But prosperity was evident from the first and a dividend of 8 per cent was declared at the first annual meeting in July, 1865.

In 1877 the enormously increased business and resources made the bank the

In 1877 the enormously increased business and resources made the bank the second institution of the kind in Canada. The opening of the west was reacted in the growth of the bank and branches were opened in 1897 at Portage La Prairie, Neepawa and Souris, Manitoba; and at Medicine Hat and Edmonton in Alberta. In 1906 branches were opened at Fort William and Vancouver. In 1910 the bank entered the maritime provinces, opening branches in Halifax and St. John. In 1910 and 1911 the profits of the institution exceeded the million mark and since the latter date the progress of the bank has been in conformity with the progress of the country, taking into account periods of depression.


