CARVELL SAYS FREIGHT RATES TO BE REDUCED

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Montreal, Aug. 3.—The Mont-
real board of trade which has ad-
dressed a resolution to the board
of railway commissioners calling
for reductions in railway freight
rates commensurate with the
twelve per cent. wage cut now in
effect, today received a reply from
Hon. F. B. Carvell, chief com-
missioner of the railway commis-
sioners board, saying that steps
will be taken in the near future
to reduce freight rates.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR INTERNATIONAL SCHOONER RACES

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 4.—(By Canadian
Press).—Since the Esperanto from Glou-
cester whose torn timbers now strew
the sand bars off Sable Island defeated
the Delaware of Lunenburg off Halifax
Harbor last fall and took to the United
States the cup presented by the Halifax
Herald and Evening Mail as emblematic
of the championship of the fishing fleet

cup have been drawn up and embodied
in the deed of gift.

LEONARD TRAINS FOR TENDER BOXYING WITH LEFT-HANDERS

New York, Aug. 4.—Benny Leonard,
lightweight title-holder, does not intend
to be caught unprepared in facing Lew
Tender of Philadelphia in the Quaker
City on the night of Aug. 12. Tender
is a left-handed boxer, and Leonard
will make every effort to adapt to the
awkward position of right hand and foot
extended in the ring, making a difficult
target for a clean, effective blow from a
boxer with the natural pose, and, in ad-
dition, discourages any set plan of at-
tack. Leonard has secured the services
of a squad of left-hand sparring part-
ners and is doing his utmost to adapt
to the exclusion of "natural" boxers, at
his training quarters in the Palisades.
