CUT WAGES TEN TO 30 PER CENT.

Textile Industry in the Philadelphia District — Some 200,000 Affected.

Philadelphia, Dec. 21.—The wages of more than 200,000 workers in the textile industry of this district are to be reduced from ten to thirty per cent. in the near future to officers of several of the union representatives today that a 25 per cent reduction would be put into effect on January 17.
New Bern, N. C., Dec. 21.—Salaries of the office force at the New Bern Iron Works and Supply Company were reduced ten per cent. yesterday when the plant was turned over to the wage earning employees for operation on a profit sharing basis. The plant is one of the largest of its kind in this section of the state.
Recently a ten per cent. wage reduction was followed by a walkout. The men returned, however, but when a second reduction of ten per cent. was announced they suggested that they be permitted to operate the plant and receive all profits above actual operating expenses. The plan was agreed to by the management.
Hosiery workers are to be reduced from fifteen to twenty-five per cent. and other knit fabric employees from ten to thirty per cent.

TRIED TO BREAK IN BUT OWNER OF SHOP READY

An attempt was made to enter the dairy, fruit and confectionery store, owned by J. Edgar Hayes, 1 Coburg street, last night. The glass in the front door was broken, but the thief was put to flight by a noise caused by M. Belyea, who was prepared to greet him. He succeeded in getting in, but was unable to get out. He was seen by the owner, who was in the store at the time, and he fled. The owner is now looking for him.

LOYD GEORGE NOT COMING TO CANADA

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 21.—Lloyd George is not coming to Canada in the near future. Some time ago it was reported in press despatches that he was planning to visit North America and Mayor Parker of Halifax wrote to Downing street, London, asking him to land at this port. Today the mayor had a letter from the premier's secretary to the effect: "Dear Sir: I am pleased by the prime minister to thank you for your letter of the 19th inst. regarding the reports to which you refer are untrue, as he sees little prospect of coming to visit Canada in the near future. Should he at any time, however, be in Canada he will bear your kind invitation to visit Halifax, in mind."

AURORA FOULED IN BERTHING TODAY

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 21.—H. M. C. S. Aurora was fouled by H. M. C. S. Paoli while the ships were being berthed this morning, and slight damage was occasioned to the flag of the new Canadian navy. The incident had the effect of delaying the official welcoming programme by half an hour.

Ontario Relief

Toronto, Dec. 21.—One-third of the amount spent by the municipalities of Ontario on emergency relief this winter will be contributed by the Ontario government, provided the other two-thirds is paid either by the municipalities and the dominion government jointly, according to an announcement made here last night by the attorney-general. The attorney-general said that before the government of Ontario handed over any money in this way it would have to be informed as to the general system and details of the relief given and the safeguard adopted to prevent abuse of the distribution, which must be approved of by the provincial government.

Action of Insurance Concerns
in Mississippi on Charge of
Combine.

New York, Dec. 21.—One hundred and thirty-eight of the insurance companies are suspending their business in the Mississippi, where their aggregate policies amount to approximately \$1,200,000,000.

This action is an outgrowth of a suit filed against them by the state revenue agent of Mississippi, charging that, in collecting the same rates, the companies have created a combine in restraint of trade.
