Would Abolish Tips.

New York, May 6.—A plan to abolish
the custom of tipping golf caddies and
reward worthy ones with a cash bonus
at the end of the season has been sug-
gested by the United States Golf Asso-
ciation, in letters sent to the secretaries
of its affiliated clubs. The caddies
would also be divided into three classes,
according to experience, and would be
paid on their rating.

Two Canadian Entries.

London, May 9.—Fifty-seven entries
have been received for the British
ladies' golf championship tournament to
begin at Newcastle, county Down, Ire-
land, on next Tuesday. This is about
a third of the record entry of 166 re-
ceived for the 1914 play. In addition to
the two Canadian entrants, Miss Flo-
rence Harvey, Hamilton, Ont., and Miss
A. C. Mackenzie, Toronto, there are
four Americans, and many prominent
English and Irish champions and for-
mer champions.

The American entrants are Miss Mar-
ion Hollins, Mrs. C. H. Vanderbeck,
Miss Mildred Caverley and Miss Ros-
amond Sherwood.

The course is considered one of the
best in the United Kingdom. It com-
prises eighteen holes and is in excellent
condition.

Carpenter's Earnings.

New York, May 10.—George Carpen-
ter will have no reason to regret his trip
to America if he does not get into the
ring with Jack Dempsey. Without ever
pulling on a fighting glove Georges will
earn during the next few months more
than twice as much as he earned during
his entire ring career in Europe. Before
Georges quit the ring in 1914 to help
defend his country he earned a little
more than \$100,000.

Breaks Thompson's Jaw.

New York, May 8.—When Fred Fulton
knocked out Jack Thompson recently,
he hit Thompson so hard with a left
hook that he broke the latter's jaw.
Thompson has not been able to eat solid
food or speak since, and the doctors say
it will be at least six months before he
will be fit to don gloves once more.
Thompson is a big negro whom Harry
Willis met in California a few months
ago. After the bout Willis said that it was im-
possible to hurt him. Evidently Fulton
is a more dangerous hitter than the
man who some critics say can beat any
heavyweight in the world, Jack Demp-
sey not excepted.

Wildie Willing; Sharkey Hagglings.
New York, May 9.—A new bantam-
weight star was discovered when "Young
Montreal" or Providence won a referee's
decision over Jack Sharkey, the man
who defeated Jimmy Wilde. Montreal
put it all over Sharkey, ten of the
twelve rounds and won hands down.

Jimmy Wilde occupied a ringside seat
and the English midget could hardly
believe his eyes when he saw the un-
known take the measure of his conquer-
or so easily. Negotiations now are on
for a match between Wilde and Sharkey
to be held in London. Wilde has accept-
ed, but Sharkey still is haggling over the
terms.
