

ROUMANIA GIVES REASONS FOR NOT SIGNING TREATY

Can Not Get Either Bukovina Or Transylvania Yet

Royal Government of Montenegro Sends Protest Against Not Being Allowed To Sign—Repeats Action Relative To German Treaty

Paris, Sept. 11.—The Roumanian delegation to the peace conference, in explaining its attitude in refusing to sign the treaty with Austria yesterday, holds that since Roumania acquired membership in the League of Nations through signing the treaty with Germany, the league must be the tribunal which will eventually consider its claims and decide whether Roumania can be forced to accept a treaty providing for foreign intervention in her domestic affairs. Roumania's objection to signing the treaty was based on a clause providing that nations receiving territory from the former Austro-Hungarian empire must provide for the protection of racial and religious minorities residing there.

Roumania might have acquired Bukovina under the Austrian treaty but, as her delegation failed to sign, the supreme council holds that the signature of other powers does not make the transfer possible until Roumania accepts the treaty. Under the proposed treaty with Hungary, Roumania would acquire Transylvania, but under the same terms relative to minorities in that region, Roumania, for this reason, is expected to refuse to sign that convention.

Paris, Sept. 10.—The royal government of Montenegro has sent a protest to the peace conference because her representatives were not permitted to sign the Austrian treaty. "All the Allied and associated powers signed the treaty with Austria, even those which did not spill a drop of blood," the protest says. "The peace conference refused the same rights to Montenegro which from the very beginning of the war voluntarily sided with the Allies, losing forty per cent of her soldiers. The royal government of Montenegro protests with the utmost energy against the attitude of the peace conference and asks the governments of the great powers to intervene to the end that such a flagrant violation of the rights and rights of Montenegro may be terminated."

The Montenegro government which makes this protest is the government which is headed by King Nicholas, and which has its headquarters in a suburb of Paris. This protest is similar to one made on June 30, which complained against the refusal of the peace conference to permit the royal Montenegro government to sign the treaty with Germany. The national assembly of Montenegro voted last December to unite the country with Yugoslavia, but the action was never recognized by the royal government, neither King Nicholas nor the Montenegro assembly had a representative at the peace conference.

U. S. AVIATOR CLAIMS TWO MAN PLANE RECORD
Dayton, O., Sept. 11.—What is believed to be a new two-man airplane altitude record was set at McCook Aviation field by Major R. W. Schroeder, when he ascended to a height of 29,000 feet. The former record was held by Captain Laing of the British Royal Air Force, who climbed to a height of 27,000 feet. Major Schroeder formerly held the height record for a single seat airplane. He was one of the contestants in the recent New York-Toronto air derby, winning a trophy for the fastest one-way trip.

SERBS ARE ORGANIZING A HUGE NEW ARMY.
Vienna, Sept. 11.—Belgrade advises state that a new Serbian army is being organized, composed equally of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes. The army will consist of ninety-three infantry regiments of four battalions each, with eight cavalry and seven artillery regiments.

RAILWAY TO BE OPERATED WITHOUT DELAY

Fredericton, N.B., Sept. 10.—Premier Foster announced this evening at the close of the afternoon session of the provincial parliament that he was expecting a telegram from D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, announcing the completion of a temporary arrangement between the C. N. R. and C. P. R. whereby the C. N. R. will be enabled to operate the St. John and Quebec Railway in and out of St. John without delay. This temporary arrangement is to be made pending a valuation of the C. P. R. between Westfield and St. John. That valuation to be used as the basis of a yearly rental by the leasing railway. Word from Mr. Hanna, however, had not been received up to the time of the closing of the government session.

Premier Foster also stated that the Government had had under consideration the matter of regulation and price of liquor which now is sold throughout the province by the wholesale and retail stores. He stated that it was probable that some arrangement would be reached, but it was yet to be determined whether the Government would appoint as had been suggested, a commission for the handling of liquor.

The Premier said he could assure the public that it would be furnished with cheaper and better liquor. Asked if that

PORTLAND, ME., MAINTAINS TITLE AS LITTLE RENO

Eighty-six Appeals for Liberty Filed on One Day—Increase Due to War Marriages.

Portland, Sept. 11.—Eighty-six divorce libels filed in one day has set a new record for "Little Reno." For several years Portland has been consistently qualifying as a divorce mark, second only to the original Reno, world-famous haven of those tired of wedlock.

On Sept. 2 there flocked to the office of the clerk a party of eighty-six men and women, with eighty-six appeals for liberty. And, on that day, there were entered on the newest divorce docket libels calculated to free 172 men and women of Cumberland County from the tie that binds. Today harassed clerks declare that subsequent petitions, filed since September 1, through special leave of court, constitute a divorce docket as outstandingly larger than any in the history of the superior court.

Semiofficial records, compiled from data in the office, disclosed a decided falling off in the number of decrees granted during the past year.

Judge's Attitude.

Judge Lauren M. Sanborn of the superior court, who is weathering his second strenuous September session in Cumberland's little Reno, says: "I make it a rule to go to the bottom of every case. If the cases are proven to my satisfaction and come within the terms of court, I'll grant divorces, though they mount to 1,000 a year. But unless a case is proven to my complete satisfaction, and there is not a possibility of effecting some reconciliation, the divorce will never be granted. Ten hundred libels entered in my court would receive the identical scrutiny accorded each lone one."

"Perhaps would-be divorces of Cumberland county are still trying me out. I do believe that sometimes the flimsiest of excuses are used, and may be one way in which to account for the alarmingly increasing number of libels filed."

"A full year ago I predicted that war marriages would furnish a notable increase in the divorce mark. Unhappily my surmise was correct."

"The war bride is apt to discover that her soldier sweetheart, robbed of the romance of a uniform, is not always a satisfactory husband. And the groom, too, who the little girl who discovers, too, that the little girl who discovered him in olive drab, is wearying of him in prosaic civ."

"A lamentable by-product of war is contained in the number of infidelity cases in which soldiers and war brides are named."

Club-women, clergy, social workers and civil reformers are considering seriously the practicability of leagueing to attack the evil that is menacing Portland.

The question of what to do and how to do it has them at wits end. The fact that the majority of libels are filed by city people of good family, with income and comparative wealth excludes the social worker from meddling with the personal affairs of the plutocrats.

Case From Near By.

According to conservative estimates, made by Judge Sanborn, four-fifths of all Cumberland divorce seekers are residents of Portland, South Portland or Westbrook. There are twenty-six communities in the county, many of them rural centres, and it is a significant fact in the minds of city clergy that at least four-fifths of the matrimonial litigants are from the county's three large cities.

If the martial wranglers were found untoured country regions, Portland reformers would go a-docking to teach them the terror of their misguided ways. But what a warfare worker do when her club sister, or possibly her social sponsor, up and files a libel?

Records for the past four years show each season, a steady increase in the number of libels filed. In 1918 the clergy of Portland threw up their hands when local papers published the fact that 172 libels had been filed, a record number. The following year there were twenty-six more, and again the clergy denounced the spreading evil.

In 1919 they near resigned in despair. There were 208 libels filed and Portland club-women forthwith took up the cudgels. So far in 1919 there are 861 libels pending.

But it isn't quite as bad as it sounds—not quite," consoled Judge Sanborn. "Often women file petitions in hot-headed, and often justifiable rage. Later they cool down. And we never hear again meant that a commission had been appointed the Premier declined to make any statement."
