MERCHANTS OF NORTH END ARE PLEASED

Christmas a Season Business Better Than in Former Years

DEATH OF DAVID LOGAN

Prominent Resident Will be Missed by Many — The Skating Prospects For the Youngsters of the Northern Section of The City

The greatness of the volume of business transacted by merchants in general throughout North End during the Christmas rush was a pleasant surprise to nobody more than to themselves. It started to increase quite noticeably more than a fortnight before the twenty-fifth of the month and continued with unabated vigor, becoming greater towards the last, until the memorable eve of Christmas. For the most part dealers express themselves to the effect that they have never had such a successful holiday trade, and this does not apply alone to one class of business, but is speaking for the majority of dealers.

There are different reasons given in accounting for the large amount of business attended to. In the first place the people throughout North End enjoyed a peaceful year and their prosperity extended to Christmas so that they had the wherewithal to purchase what they desired as remunerations for their relatives and friends, in addition to the necessary commodities for the Christmas dinner. Aside from those whose employment is permanent throughout the year, those who depend upon the lumber industry for their necessities of life, and there are a great many, had a successful holiday season, and in addition when the skating season closed with many of the plants, the demand for furs at the winterport was most satisfactory.

Conditions were so bright in St. John during the year closing next week that hardly anyone, so much as what line of work he followed, need have been without more or less steady employment, and that this is so, was largely responsible for the fact that dealers experienced such a volume of business during the holiday rush. In the North End it was largely a matter of trade, and that is a point worth considering. The people bought freely, and their purchases of remembrances for those near and dear to them were by no means petty little things, nor were they limited to a very few.

When they open their books to reckon up there are few merchants in the district in question who cannot say that the year was one of the best, if not the most successful in their history, and they have therefore every reason to be cheerful in anticipating what the coming twelve-month holds in store. Several new stores sprang into existence during the last few months and there are promises that others will do so during the next year, for it is certain that the field for business is expanding in North End, and that many shoppers there, who have possibly been given to the habit of coming to the city for some things they wanted, are making their purchases in their own neighborhood, and people from Milford, Parrville, and surrounding districts are adding their quota to the volume of trade.



The death of David Logan, a well known and respected resident of the North End, occurred yesterday afternoon. Mr. Logan was in the 81st year of his age. His wife, who was formerly Miss Mary A. Stewart, of Stanley, N. B., died two years ago and since his wife's death he had a steadily failing health. He was born in Pennsylvania, and while a young man removed to this city. In his early days he was the captain of the old steam ferry, the Telegraph, which plied between Indiantown and Pleasant Point. During the latter part of his life he was employed as janitor of the Alexandra school, and resigned that position only a year ago.

Mr. Logan is survived by one sister, Mrs. William Alcorn, of Shelburne, Washington territory; one son, S. E. Logan of the city; three daughters, Mrs. Harry Pitt, of Main street, Mrs. Wellington Andrews of Victoria street, and Mrs. Harry Estabrooks of Main street. He is also survived by six grandsons, seven grand-daughters and one great grand-daughter. Mr. Logan was at one time a prominent member of the Temple of Honor and Temperance, being past worthy chief templar of Alexandra Temple. He was also past chief of Riverside council of the same order. He was a member of Victoria street Baptist church. In politics he was a Conservative. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at half past three o'clock from the residence of Mrs. Wellington Andrews, 109 Victoria street. The service will be under the auspices of the Temple of Honor.

It is now believed that there are chances for the recovery of Miss Janie Rodday, who was buried on Thursday in her home at the corner of Acadia and High streets. She is being treated in the General Public Hospital.

With a fair stay of crisp, cold weather, there is plenty of ice, there seems every prospect of the winter being enjoyable to the young folk of North End who are keen for skating. The track in the milldam in the rear of Adelaide street, contrary to general expectations, has not been so drained off as to make the place unsuitable for skating, and in the early part of the week there was a splendid sheet of ice there. The fact that the cove has been dredged to a much greater extent seems to have bettered conditions.
