R., when an engine, running light, collided with the rear of a train of empty freight cars stalled at the crossing. The van or caboose was on the tracks in Gregory's field. The engine had been following the freight from west St. John, but to allow the Boston train to pass, it became necessary to halt the string of empties near the crossing, and of this the engineer in charge of the locomotive following had no knowledge. Knowing the light engine was coming behind, the conductor in charge of the freight sent back a man to the rear to signal, but he did not reach the required distance in time, and the engine bumped with considerable force, into the halted freight. The caboose caught fire, it is thought, from the upsetting of the stove inside, and was almost completely destroyed. The engine was damaged about the pilot, light, and front, but no one was hurt.
