LA MARQUISE de FONTENAY
Cousin of Charles Stewart Parnell
A Prince on Trial

Young Lord Congleton who, while on a shooting expedition to the interior of British Columbia, has given out in Edmonton, Alberta, an extravagant newspaper interview, printed far and wide throughout the United States, is the head of the House of Parnell, and a cousin of Charles Stewart Parnell, the great Irish leader. Unlike the latter, Lord Congleton is an opponent of Irish Home Rule. In his interview he professes to be in the confidence of the Unionist leaders in Ulster, and a party to their secret plans for resisting the Liberal administration's pro-Irish policy plans which he more than hints, are destined to take the shape of a military expedition.

Lord Congleton takes his title from the town of Congleton, in Cheshire, from which the Parnell family hail, and whence Tobias Parnell, one of the aldermen of the place, migrated to Ireland and purchased an estate there in the reign of Charles II. His son, Archdeacon Thomas Parnell, of Oughter, was celebrated as a poet, was an intimate friend of Pope, Swift, Addison and Steele, and is mentioned in many of their writings. The archdeacon's nephew, John Parnell, was created a baronet of Ireland, and it was his son, successor and namesake who was so celebrated as a statesman, holding office as chancellor of the exchequer and lord of the treasury.

He had many warm friends and admirers, among them an Irish landowner and county magistrate, Samuel Haughey, in token of affection and regard, bequeathed to him his Avondale estate in county Wicklow. Sir John Parnell, on his death, left the Avondale estate to his third son William, whose own son, John Henry, married Daine, daughter of Commodore Charles Stewart, of the United States navy, and was the father of Charles Stewart Parnell, the Irish Nationalist leader. Since the latter's death the Avondale property has been purchased by the government for use as a national forestry school for Ireland, the rooms which he occupied being kept as nearly as possible as they were during his lifetime.

I mentioned that Sir John Parnell bequeathed the Haughey estate of Avondale to his third son William. The Haughey estate and the baronetcy passed to the second son, Henry Parnell, who was created Lord Congleton. If his elder brother was eliminated from the succession of the family honors and estates, it was by virtue of a special act of the Irish parliament, passed in 1789, owing to the fact that he was from his birth terribly deformed, and from his infancy, speech and reason. He was indeed an afflicted creature, whose existence was a source of unhappiness all his family, and nevertheless survived to the age of more than forty.

The second Lord Congleton was a missionary, and a Plymouth Brother. His first wife died while he was doing missionary work in Bombay, and he thereupon married a Persian woman of Shiraz, widow of an Armenian merchant, Yusuff Conratty, a purchase of Berthier's, who paid \$1,000,000 francs for it to Fouché, Duke of Otranto, the famous minister of police. Today it is worth at least five times that sum.

Serve on toast.
