#### POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning Thomas Quinn was fined \$5 or two months in jail on the charge of drunkenness, and John Mulla was remanded on the same charge. Mary Craig, an old woman, arrested for wandering about in Winter street last night, was ordered to be sent to the almshouse. Jeremiah Daley and Andrew Hamburg, charged with fighting together in Union street were again brought into court and further remanded. John O'Brien, evidence of seeing Hamburg rush at Daley twice, Hamburg said that he was trying to get back a ten dollar bill which Daley had stolen from him. Daley denied the theft, but pleaded guilty to fighting.

### POLICE LIABLE FOR USE OF HANDCUFFS SAYS JUDGE RITCHIE

#### Judgement in Stilwell Case Deferred Till Tomorrow Morning—Prisoner's Counsel Scores Policeman for Entering Shop

"The police had better use more precaution in the use of their handcuffs when making an arrest, or some day they may be taken to court and sued for damages," said Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning in commenting on the arrest of Walter Stilwell by Sergeant Campbell and Policeman Kane.

Stilwell was remanded from yesterday morning and the case was brought up again at 10 o'clock this morning. Policeman Kane and Mrs. Stilwell were recalled, but nothing new was brought out in the evidence, except that Kane testified that Campbell hit the prisoner on the head three times with his baton. Sergeant Campbell wanted to have the case laid over until tomorrow morning in order to have other witnesses present, but the court did not grant the request.

In summing up the case for the defence, Mr. Wallace, K. C., contended that the manner in which the prisoner was arrested was nothing short of an outrage.

"A man's house is his castle," continued the counsel, "and to think that these two police officers should go into this man's house and not only arrest him but beat him over the head with a baton, is shameful. It is a question whether these men had any right to go into Stilwell's home and arrest him without a warrant, and I believe that they could be called upon to pay heavy damages."

His Honor in summing up said that he had warned the police time and time again about the use of handcuffs and batons, and would not be surprised to see some of them before a court some day being sued for damages.

"The only time that handcuffs can be used on a British subject is when he is trying to escape from custody, and if used on other occasions the officer is liable for damages. I will think this case over carefully and consider whether or not the police were justified in making the arrest as they did."

Judgment in the case will be given tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

### LIBERAL CONVENTION IN ST. JOHN, AUG. 10

#### Executive Will Meet on Monday Next—Kings-Albert Liberals Will Also Name Candidate Next Week

The Liberal executive for St. John city will meet next Monday, and the convention to nominate candidates will be held on the following Thursday, Aug. 10th. The delegates, it will be remembered, have already been chosen.

The Kings-Albert Liberal convention will also be held next week. The party throughout the province is lining up for a vigorous and successful campaign.

### BARRISTERS' HONOR LATE SHERIFF RITCHIE

#### Resolution of Appreciation and of Condolence With Relatives Adopted at Special Meeting of Law Society This Morning

At a special meeting of the St. John Law Society this morning at which the attendance was quite large, a resolution was passed, on motion of W. V. Ewing, K. C., seconded by Daniel Mullin, K. C., expressing sympathy in the death of Sheriff Ritchie. The following is the text of the resolution:

Whereas the Saint John Law Society has learned, with regret, of the death of Mr. Robert Rankine Ritchie, High Sheriff of the City and County of Saint John, formerly an active member of this society and a barrister for over twenty-five years' standing;

And, whereas, during the period in which he was engaged during the ten years of his occupancy of the office of High Sheriff of the City and County of Saint John he came in close contact with most of the members of the profession, and by his upright and honorable conduct he enjoyed the confidence and respect, not only of the members of the profession, but of the community at large;

Therefore resolved, that the members of this society, as a token of respect for his memory, place on record their appreciation of his worth as an honorable member of the legal profession and as one who filled to the satisfaction of the whole community the responsible office of High Sheriff and as an honorable and estimable citizen;

And, further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to his immediate relatives with expressions of sympathy and regret on the part of the members of the Saint John Law Society.
