Daily Hints
For the Cook

PRUNE TARTLETS

Line small tins with pastry and in each place a tablespoonful of prune pulp, prepared by rubbing cooked prunes through a sieve and adding two tablespoonfuls of fine bread crumbs to each cupful of fruit. Cover with the following mixture: Two tablespoonfuls each of butter and sugar beaten to a cream, two eggs, two-thirds of a cupful bread crumbs, 10 drops almond extract and one teaspoonful baking powder.

PEACHES AND DUMPLINGS

Take one pound of dried peaches, wash clean, then add one-half gallon cold water, boil down until one quart of juice remains. Add one-half cupful of sugar to peaches. For Dumplings—Take two eggs, one tablespoonful beef dripping, 2 tablespoonfuls sugar, pinch of salt, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon; beat until light, add one-half cupful milk, one and one-half teaspoonfuls baking powder, then add enough flour to drop from spoon without sticking. Use tablespoon in dropping dumplings into the boiling peaches. Let all boil 10 minutes.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Samuel Curtis, a railroad yardman, although fatally injured by having a freight train pass over his leg, prolonged his life yesterday at Toronto, by himself bandaging the wounds. He had won a diploma in the practice of first aid and as he never lost consciousness he took the bandages from those working with him and was quite cheerful when Dr. Bateman arrived.

Tue Martin was lost in Georgian Bay yesterday with all hands. She was towing the larger Albatross when in a gale the latter foundered, and carried the tug with her. Captain and Mrs. Vent and four others were aboard the tug at the time, and they perished. The passengers on the barge escaped in a boat.

After spending a pleasant day at the picnic of the Cross Creek Baptist church Thursday, Miss Millie Sparks, of Green Hill, N. B., died suddenly last night of heart disease. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Sparks, and her parents are survived by twelve brothers and sisters. The sad affair cast a gloom over the community.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY

MAKES STATEMENT ON
IMPORTANT MATTERS

Courtenay Bay Announcement in Few Days—The Durant Property—The Valley Railway—Salisbury & Harvey Line

Hon. Mr. Pugsley, minister of public works, gave a reporter last evening interesting information in regard to several projects in which the people of this city as well as the whole province are keenly interested.

When asked about the work at Courtenay Bay, Hon. Mr. Pugsley said: "I have nothing to say at present but in the course of a few days I will have an announcement of interest to people of St. John to make in this connection."

Hon. Mr. Pugsley was also asked in reference to the Salisbury & Albert railway and to the Standard's report that no authority had been given for the turning over of I. C. B. rule to carry on operations on the road. To this the minister of public works said that the company owning the road had accepted the proposition made by the minister of railways, the matter had been definitely settled and the rails were now in process of being supplied.

In speaking of the Valley Railway, Hon. Mr. Pugsley reviewed the negotiations, and showed that Hon. Mr. Fleming, acting minister of the province, had given him definite assurance that they were satisfied as to the financial ability of the St. John and Quebec Railway Co. to construct the road and he (Mr. Pugsley) had informed Mr. Gould, president of the company, that he would have much pleasure in recommending the federal subsidy to his company. Draft contracts were agreed upon at a joint meeting of representatives of the two governments and the company, but Hon. Mr. Fleming requested that the contract for the Dominion subsidy be not entered into with the company until the provincial government secured further information as to the financial ability of the company.

There the matter rested, and Hon. Mr. Pugsley has never since received any word from Hon. Mr. Fleming as to whether or not the information the provincial government had wanted had been received. In view of these facts, Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that before Mr. Hazen had made his Gagetown statement seeking to place the federal government the responsibility for the delay in beginning the construction of the road, he should have consulted his league, Hon. Mr. Fleming, and learned the facts of the case.

The matter of the Durant sugar refinery property was referred to, and Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that Mayor Brink and Ald. Russell, representing a committee of the common council, waited upon him yesterday in reference to the federal government permitting the city to retain the property, on which it had been expected that Mr. Durant would erect a sugar refinery, in case his rights were forced upon him by not proceeding with the work pursuant to the agreement made by Mr. Durant and the city.

"I informed the committee," said Dr. Pugsley, "that I would recommend to the minister of railways that the request of the city should be complied with on condition that there should be erected on the property some large manufacturing plant, the construction of which would afford to the Intercolonial Railway the same proportion of freight which was used in case the refinery had been built."

THE BLOOD THAT IS
THICKER THAN WATER

(Sir Wilfrid at Three Rivers.)
I do not often parade my loyalty. I was born under British institutions. My people found liberty they would not have had under any other regime, and I could not but stand by that. Because I value the liberty of my country, I have laid before you all the objections which are raised against this agreement. These objections, you will agree, do not stand discussion. As to the advantages, they are obvious, but they need no reiteration. But the more thoroughly they are discussed the clearer they appear. This agreement constitutes a bond of peace and a harmony of friendship between the two nations. It insures that there shall be and remain a bond of mutual respect between them. We share with our neighbors the northern hemisphere. We spring practically from the same stock. Our common forefathers came from England, Scotland, Ireland, France to a certain extent, and Germany. We have inherited practically the same institutions.

In 1898, at the battle of Manila, when the Americans were fighting the Spaniards, a European squadron, the British waters, and its commander wanted to show his sympathy in a practical way with the Spaniards. But the commander of a British squadron was also in those waters, and he stated that there would have to be fair play between the combatants, and that if there was any interference he would have his ships by the side of Admiral Dewey's.

This was the voice of the blood that is thicker than water. It was only last week that a treaty was signed by King George and the President of the United States which makes it impossible hereafter that there shall be war between Britain and the United States. It has been given to us to see that day—but far-reaching as is that agreement, is it to be supposed that it is the final and supreme expression of the friendship between the two countries? No, for in my heart the belief that that treaty may be supplemented in a way which will endeavor to undo the mischief which was done in the 18th century by the violent separation of mother and child. This agreement, which has been made, and a contribution toward that ideal. It will not only be a powerful factor in the material prosperity of our country, but it is an advance toward that higher civilization which recent events have shown to be within the range of practical possibility. This agreement is before you today.

Canada's trade with the United States fifteen years ago was \$111,022,513. Last year it had increased to over \$404,000,000. Are Canadians less loyal because their trade with that country increased almost four-fold in fifteen years?

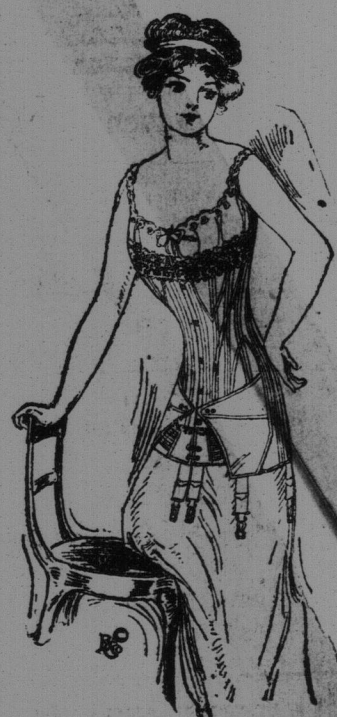
