20 WHITE GIRLS HELD IN RAID ON JAPANESE DANCE

Detectives Enter Riverside Drive Place by Ruse and Young Women Run Into Arms of Police in Cordon.

(New York Tribune.)
Three patrol loads of girls were taken to the Jefferson Market court yesterday morning, when police raided a Japanese school at 321 Riverside Drive and arrested the proprietor and the hostesses. Residents of the district, who had complained to the police, gathered around and spoke their approval as the struggling women were forced into the patrol cars.
It was only after a ruse that the raiding detectives, Andrew McLaughlin and William Hinkle, of Inspector Bolan's staff, got into the place, since it was a school to teach Japanese-American dances and no white men were allowed to enter. A Japanese was employed, and as he was bowing his way out the detectives rushed in. The house was surrounded by a cordon of police.
They arrested Tucker Takasaki, the proprietor, and Mrs. Lillian Murphy, the hostess. About sixty Japanese were in the place, police said, and when the officers went in they found many girls sitting with Japanese and others dancing to the music of a phonograph. The house was surrounded by a cordon of police.
When the detectives rushed in about twenty girls ran upstairs and even to the roof, hoping to escape by the fire escape. They walked into the arms of waiting patrolmen and were hauled into the patrol cars.
A few during the raid hurriedly telephoned their homes, and in some cases fathers and mothers saw their daughters taken away. Some girls were incensed, and declared they had done nothing wrong; that it was a dancing school and they were instructed. Others said they were there merely to dance.
Takasaki has operated other dancing schools that were raided. Recently his place at 121 West Seventy-second Street was raided, twelve girls were arrested and liquor was confiscated. He is out on bail in this case.
He appeared cool and took his arrest calmly, but Mrs. Murphy, who said she had once been a nurse, became excited and asserted "nothing wrong" had gone on while she was at the school. Arraigned in West Side Court, Magistrate Goodman fixed bail at \$500 each on the two women and a dance hall without a license. Takasaki paid his \$500. Mrs. Murphy pleaded with the magistrate not to lock her up in "that filthy cell." Magistrate Goodman asked Takasaki why he didn't bail the woman out, and the Japanese shrugged his shoulders and said he had no more money. The magistrate reduced bail to \$250 for each woman, but only eight could furnish the money. Others were taken to the Florence Crittenton home.



MAYOR PRESENTS YEARLY REPORT

Predicts Advance in Prosperity Following Use of Hydro—The City's Debt.

The report of the Commissioner of Finance and Public Affairs, Mayor Fisher for 1922, was received yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Common Council. The opinion was expressed that when St. John had gained what its people had been fighting for (hydro-electricity supplied to the people at the lowest possible price, free from profit to any company) there should be a great advance industrially and a large increase in the comfort of the people through freer and more extensive use of electricity.
Reference to the reports of the Chamberlain and Comptroller will show that no bonds were issued in 1922; work, however, was undertaken and carried to completion during the year requiring bond issues amounting to \$228,500.
These consisted of \$86,800 for ferry approaches; \$27,700 for wharves; \$23,600 for paving, etc.; \$17,000 for City Hall elevator; \$2,200 for new motor fire apparatus; \$1,400 for hook and ladder building; \$72,200 for water mains and \$47,200 for sewers.
Delaying the issue of the bonds until the early part of 1923 has saved the city a considerable sum in interest.
As showing very large increases in receipts and expenditures by the city during the years from 1908 to 1922 and consequent large increases in the amount of work done by the treasury, assessing and other departments, I would refer the reader of this report to the report of the Chamberlain, and would point out that the bonded debt of the city has not very greatly increased in the above period, the debt at the end of the 1908, after deducting the amount in the sinking funds, being \$4,160,000, and at the end of 1922 \$4,940,000, including the \$228,500 to be issued.
The above figures do not include bonds issued for school purposes, amounting on June 30 last to \$908,500, against which there was a sinking fund of \$97,200. Bonds for hospitals and other county purposes for which the city is mainly responsible, its proportion being about seven-eighths, are also not included and they amount to \$881,700, against which the sinking fund amount is \$139,200.

RENT AND TAXATION PAID BY SWEDISH AID SYSTEM

Bureau Organized to Relieve Members of Personal Inconvenience in Payments.

Stockholm, March 10.—(By Mail.)—In Sweden a man does not have to remember to pay his rent, his income tax, or his insurance premiums, nor suffer the penalty of forgetting, if he joins the General Installment Fund and Payment Bureau, a co-operative service institution which announces the completion of its organization in Stockholm.
The operation of the bureau is as follows: Membership is secured by paying an admission fee of three crowns, or about 75 cents, and membership dues of 2.50 crowns. The member then instructs his employer to deduct weekly or monthly allotments from his pay. These are sent direct to the bureau, and must be large enough so that the sum accrued will cover the payments of rent, light bills, insurance premiums, taxes, and other recurring dues which the bureau meets on account of the member. There are even loan funds at the disposal of members who are in arrears upon entrance.
Besides the handling of general installments for the interest of its members a saving department is maintained, as well as a department for the writing of insurance policies.

THREE OLD SCOTTISH PISTOLS STOLEN FROM DOVER MUSEUM

London, March 8.—(By Mail.)—Three old Scottish pistols, thirty-six swords, two artillery sabres and four bayonets have been stolen from the Maidon Dieu Museum at Dover, says a "London Daily Mail" item.
These weapons, of no practical use

but of great historic interest, formed part of a collection lent to Dover from the Tower of London Armoury, and their disappearance was discovered only when Tower officials were making their annual examination.

There is no trace of the thief or thieves, and it is thought that if any one had tried to dispose of the Scottish pistols, which were picked up after the battle of Culloden, some inquiry would have been made.

The museum is open free to the public all day. In the adjoining town hall, entered from the Maidon Dieu, dances and entertainments are held at night.

ACROBAT GETS 20 YEARS TO LIFE AS GIRL'S SLAYER

Second Degree Murder Plea Accepted Following Lunacy Commission's Verdict.

New York, April 18.—Harold Van Aalstine, twenty-four years old, a vaudeville acrobat, living at 102 West Forty-eighth street, was sentenced to twenty years to life in Sing Sing recently by Judge Joseph F. Mulqueen in General Sessions on his plea of guilty to shooting to death Miss Marian MacLaren, thirty, of the "Five Musical MacLarens," in a restaurant at 461 Eighth avenue the night of last January 12.
The young acrobat was indicted for first degree murder, but after he had refused to consult his counsel a lunacy commission was appointed by Judge John F. McIntyre. As a result of the commission's verdict, Assistant District Attorney George N. Brotherton, recommended acceptance of a plea of second degree murder.
"An Aalstine had been engaged to Miss MacLaren, and when she broke the engagement he cancelled his contract and followed her from city to city, endeavoring to effect a reconciliation. On the night of the slaying he followed her from the stage door of the Grand Opera House to the restaurant, and, besides shooting her, wounded her brother, Hugh, in the arm, and attempted to end his own life.
