## N.S. BOY WINS HIGH HONORS IN THE U.S.

Nephew of St. John Man Receives Blue Ribbon Law Award.

At a banquet tendered to the Law graduates at Dalhousie University this year by the Dalhousie Law Association, Professor H. F. Munro made the announcement that one of last year's graduates, N. A. M. MacKenzie, had won the Blue Ribbon prize in International Law conducted at Washington. The prize is worth about \$1,000 a year and is much coveted by the various law schools of the United States. He felt, not only was Mr. MacKenzie to be congratulated, but Dalhousie also. He expressed the desire that greater interest should be taken in the study of International Law, as although it might not be of much practical value to the average lawyer, yet it was of inestimable value to those of the legal profession who might enter public life.

N. A. M. MacKenzie is a son of Rev. Mr. MacKenzie, formerly pastor at Durham. He had a distinguished career at Dalhousie, and his present success is believed largely due to his work in International Law done at Dalhousie under the able tuition of Prof. Munro.

Mr. MacKenzie is a nephew of K. J. MacRae of St. John.

## CHINESE PIRATES GET ONE CANADIAN

Government Makes Representations at Washington and London in His Behalf.

Ottawa, Ont., May 30.—The Dominion Government is now awaiting the result of representations made yesterday afternoon to the United States authorities at Washington and the Colonial Office in London in regard to the capture of R. A. Jaffrey, of Toronto, Canadian head of the Christian Mission Alliance at Wuchow, who was carried off by Chinese pirates. Premier King on receipt of the news that Mr. Jaffrey, in company with three other missionaries, had been carried off, wired London and Washington requesting that everything be done to obtain release of the captives.

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## JURY VISIT SCENE, THEN SAY GUILTY

Gardiner Claims That He was Trying to Catch Guilty Party.

After deliberating for two hours and then visiting the scene in automobiles, a jury in the County Court this afternoon returned a verdict of guilty against Frank Gardiner, charged with attempting to break and enter the store of Altek Taylor near East St. John.

Judge J. A. Barry, who presided, adjourned the court until June 10, when civil cases will be taken up. Gardiner will likely be sentenced at that time.

W. M. Ryan conducted the prosecution and W. A. Ross appeared on behalf of the prisoner.

Evidence for the crown was given by Mr. Taylor, who said there was a shower being held at his home that evening and, as he did not care to arrive home before the ladies had left the house, he took a walk as far as the dry dock. While in the vicinity of the Taylor store, he heard a crash and immediately afterwards saw a man run from the store, he followed in an effort to overtake the culprit, picking up a stone on the way and putting it in his pocket. The other man disappeared and a few minutes later the detectives grabbed himself. He said he told them about the other man but that they refused to go in search of him. This closed the evidence.

The jury retired at 11:10 and just two hours later they reported that they were unable to come to an agreement. They suggested that a visit to the scene of the crime might clear up some of the doubt in the minds of the jurors, so cars were ordered by the court and the jury left in charge of two constables for East St. John.

The jury was composed of Frank Barbour, Victor Scott, William Warner, Alfred Fraser, Frank Banks, Walter S. Knowles, Frederick Bryden, James Laidlaw, Harrison T. Muller, Ernest Nagle, Heber E. Collins and Walter Logan.
