Portland, Me., Sept. 12.—(Canadian Press)—A revision of the returns of the vote cast in the special elections yesterday on the question of taking prohibition out of the state constitution, shows, with only fourteen small towns missing, a majority of 763 against constitutional prohibition. 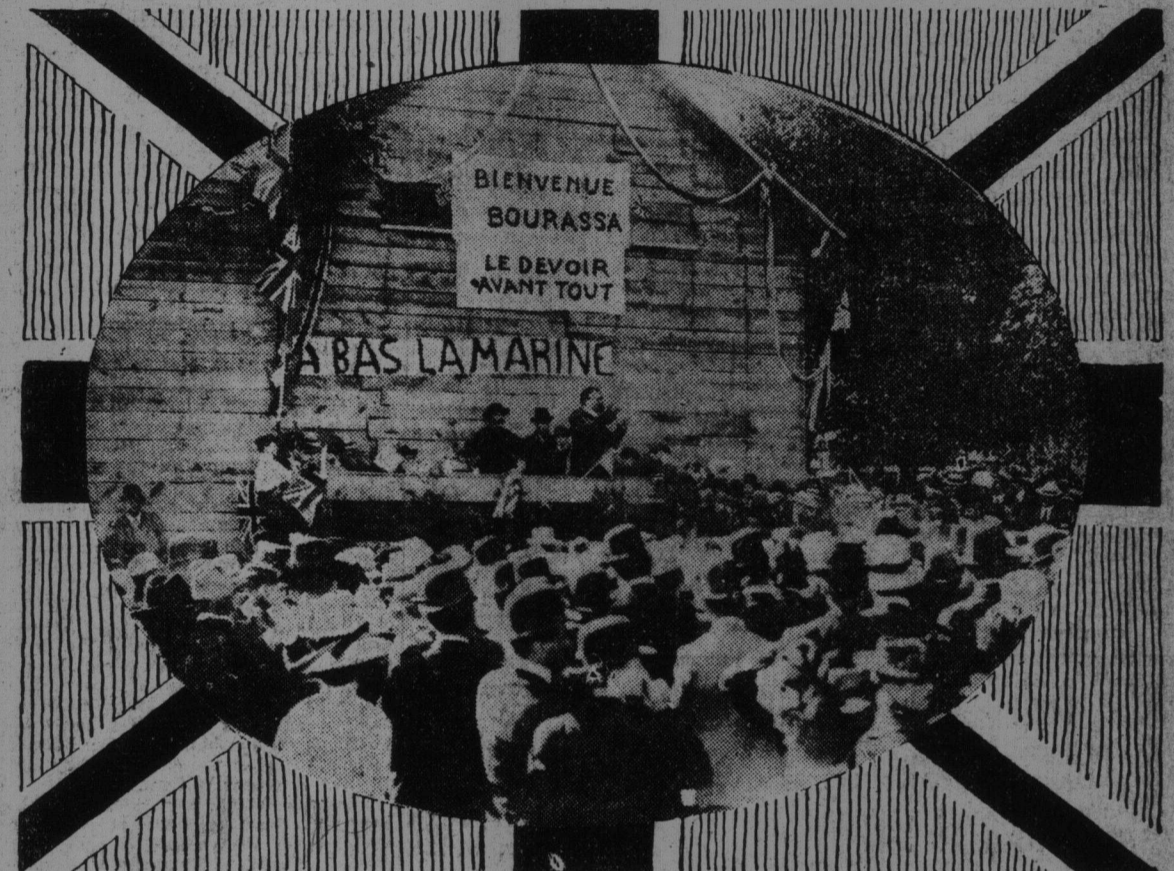
