FIRST EDITION. RICHELIEU.

PROBABILITY OF PROBLE BEING CAUSED THERE BY MR. MARSH.

MONTREAL, Feb. 14.—There is likely to be trouble in Richelieu county. Hon. Mr. Mercer says he has received a notice from Hon. Mr. Languevin, the late member, that if Hon. Mr. Languevin runs in that county he will issue a manifesto asking the friends to vote for the opposition candidate. He says he has been badly treated by Languevin. Being too weak to attend the nomination, the meeting was packed by supporters of Languevin and the nomination went from him. Mr. Mercer says he has made many sacrifices for this county and could have been elected even had he not shown himself during the contest. Some Gouin, Mercer's non-law, will oppose Languevin in this county.

FIRST EDITION. ENGLAND'S INTEREST.

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT HASTENS TO TAKE CONCERN IN CANADIAN INTERESTS.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—The Canadian situation attracts much attention. The government manifests great concern in the outcome of Sir John Macdonald's campaign. It is felt that Canada is about to decide a momentous question affecting all of the English colonies. The Press notes the McKinley law is responsible for the situation.

It is known that the government goes further back than the McKinley law in that active measures are necessary to revive the present drooping trade in Canada. During the year 1888 there were 12,000,000 pounds worth of Canadian imports against 20,000,000 pounds worth from the East Indies. From the United States, England took 27,000,000 worth in the same year. As a means of saving Canada from any longings for reciprocity or absorption, the government after consulting a number of experts has decided to do back to an almost unlimited extent, the projected mail route to Japan and Australia via the Canada Pacific Railway.

In connection with this route it is proposed to build a railway from Halifax to the South of England and Halifax, under a government subsidy and also to provide for any party who should turn Queen's evidence other than the actual murderer.
