**FORTUNES MADE FROM FEARS.**

Lloyd's, the great English association of shipowners and marine insurance brokers, is two hundred and thirty-five years old, says a London paper. It has outlived fifty Governments. It has bought risk for ten generations and has never once defaulted in the payment of a loss. The doors of its offices are never closed.

Lloyd's has a reserve fund of \$25,000,000, and its yearly income is about \$100,000,000, all of which is made by taking risks. Lloyd's make millions of dollars every year out of the fears of business men.

No matter what a business man fears, if he goes to Lloyd's they will bet him it will not happen, and it is a hundred chances to one it will not happen.

The merchants who first met together in the seventeenth century in the coffee house of Edward Lloyd, from which the name of Lloyd's is derived, recognized the fact that out of every hundred fears there is really and usually only one danger. The knowledge of this fact of human nature and its practical application, has made huge fortunes for Lloyd's.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY  
Section 137 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1906, says—  
No person shall establish install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Newfoundland except under and in accordance with a license granted by the Post Office.

Forms for Amateur License may be obtained at office of Minister of Posts & Telegraphs, St. John's, and call signals furnished and recorded.
