LATEST NEWS

Saginaw, Mich., Nov. 24.—The ex-
tensive lumber yard of A. T. Bliss, at
Carrollton, was wiped out by fire last
night.

Of 6,000,000 feet of hardwood and
pine, only a few blackened piles, esti-
mated to contain about 20,000 feet re-
main this morning. Col. Bliss esti-
mates his loss at about \$50,000, which
is fully covered by insurance.

Montreal, Nov. 24.—McLeod Stewart,
who went to England some time ago
with the object of interesting the im-
perial government and English finan-
ciers in the Georgian Bay canal scheme,
has returned, and says that he has suc-
ceeded in inducing a leading firm of
English contractors to furnish the cap-
ital required, and to construct the
canal, which will connect the west with
Ottawa and Montreal by way of the
Georgian Bay, Nipissing and Ottawa-
rivers.

THE MARKETS.

(Via L. J. Atwater's Private Wire.)

Chicago, Nov. 24.—The wheat market
has been of the ante-holiday order. The
volume of business hasn't been large
and to a great extent the evening up
of contracts on the part of local trad-
ers. There is no question about the
statistical situation being bullish. We
are in for a bull market in future.

There is nothing to say of corn. Of
course any material rise in wheat
affect the corn market to a certain
extent. There has been no feature
worthy of note to-day regarding corn.
Oats are dull and lifeless, with hardly
a change in figures from evening to the
close. They left off at same figures
as last night.

Provisions continue to drag with
balance of market, although there was
a little more trade to-day than for
some time past. The packers reported
good cash demand for hams and this
about offset the liberal receipts of
hogs. As long as heavy receipts con-
tinue we do not see how prices can
advance very much.
