THE LATE I. C. B. Accident. The verdict of the jury in the matter of the accident on the I. C. R. on February 8th was rendered before Coroner Dr. Meahan last Saturday as follows: "We, the jury, find that William Bastin, engine driver on the I. C. R., came to his death on the eighth day of February, 1898, by his engine, No. 156, leaving the track about one quarter of a mile west of Beresford platform in the parish of Beresford in the County of St. John, New Brunswick, by coming off the left hand wheel of the forward truck of the engine, and the jury further find from the evidence produced that the death of said William Bastin was purely accidental, and that no blame can be attached to the Dominion government or any of its employees."

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK. Controllable expenses, \$1,000,000. Executive government, \$2,000,000. Legislative expenses, \$2,000,000. Public buildings, lanterns, etc., \$1,000,000. Making a total of \$6,000,000.

MR. Tweedie - Now I think my honorable friend will see. I think this and the other statement that I have made from time to time, and I have made them to the satisfaction of the province of Nova Scotia and the expenditures of the province have been very much in favor of the province of New Brunswick.

NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF TIMBER LICENSES. Crown Lands Office, 24 June, 1896. The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 10 of the Timber Regulations which reads as follows:- "In no portion of any Crown land shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, not even for pulp, which will not make a log at least 12 feet in length and 12 inches at the small end; and if any such shall be cut, the Licensee shall be liable to double stampage, and the Licensee be forfeited."
