

Destructive Fire

At Chatham

Premises of W. J. Groat Destroyed—Loss About \$4,000 and No Insurance.

Chatham, N. B., Nov. 3.—Fire early this morning wiped out the blacksmith, carriage and repair shops of W. J. Groat, at the corner of Water and King streets and gutted the rear of W. J. Connor's grocery store next door, so that what goods were not burned were badly water soaked. Mr. Groat's loss was total, as he had no insurance on buildings or stock, and will approach \$4,000, as his large wedding coach, some carts and sleighs also fell victims to the flames. Mr. Connor's loss is hard to estimate, but may go about \$1,800 including that on the building. He has considerable insurance.
