The captain was dazed by the sudden firing of the pistol shots and fell prostrate on his face. The mate rushed to the captain's aid, disarmed the would-be assassin and secured him. The wounds are not of a fatal nature. Three of the bullets are close to the surface. He was immediately put in trons. He is 29 years of age and a native of Germany. When seen this afternoon he stated that he had no recollection whatever of shooting Captain McNeill, and appeared to be demented.

THE BRITISH COMMONS.

Speaker Peel Tenders His Resignation in a Touching Address.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer Intro the Local Veto Bill.

London, April 8.-Before a crowded house, at 3.30 p. m., the speaker of the house of commons, the Rt. Hon. Arthur Wellesley Peel, M. P., arose and nounced his resignation. He then delivered his farewell address. When the speaker arose there was prolonged cheering, and every member present uncovered his head. The peers' and other galleries were full. U. S. Ambassador Bayard and many other members of the diplomatic corps

were present. Sir Arthur Peel concluded a touchin gaddress by saying: "I hope that by the co-operation of all its members the house will continue to be the patterr and model for foreign nations for those great people who have left our shores and carried our blood, race language, institutions, habits and thoughts to the uttermost parts of the world."

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Wm. Harcourt, in expressing the thanks of the house for the services of Sir Arthur Peel, paid a high tribute to the zeal, ability and unremit attention and firmness with which he had maintained the privileges and dignity of the house. He concluded with moving an address to her majesty, praying that a signal mark of royal favor may be conferred upon the late speaker.

The motion, which was supported by Mr. Balfour, the leader of the conservatives in the house of commons was unanimously adopted.

The parliamentary secretary of th foreign office, Sir Edward Grey, replying to a question on the subject, said that the government had heard that the ex-queen of Hawaii had been senterced to imprisonment, but, he added, the matter was not one in which Great Britain could interfere, nor were there any grounds upon which Great Britain could base a represent ation on the subject.

Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt then in troduced the local veto bill. The chancellor of the exchequer, in introducing the measure, said that the bill provided that a poll should be taken on the request of a tenth of the num ber of parochial electors. Prohibitory resolutions would be carried by a majority of two-thirds and would come into force on the first of January on the expiration of a year from the date of the pool. After three years the prohibitory resolutions might be repealed by a simple majority instead of two-thirds. The bill did not provide compensation, but provided a time limit when licenses wer extinguished. He pointed out that in the United States the question of compensation received no attention, li-censes being simply refused. The same system, he added, prevailed in Sweden and Norway. -

Alas! thousands.

The question as to what Nelson really signaled at Trafalgar has been raised in London. At the naval exhibition a box made of wood from his flagship, the Victory, carried a legend which purported to be "the correct version" of the signal. The alleged correction consisted in the substitution, at the very beginning of the signal of "The Commander in Chief" for " England," and in the insertion of "this day," after "every man" and before " will do his duty." A writer in the Leeds Mercury points out that the superfluous "this day" are simply borrowed from Braham's lyrical version of the signal, in the refrain of this once famous song, 'Twas in Tra-falgar's Bay. The substitution of "The Commander in Chief" for "England" is less easy to account for; though the original signal as framed by Nelson is known to have been "Nelson ex-

A correspondent of the London Standard, whose grandfather as flag lieutenant gave out the signal, states, on his grandfather's authority, that which was not in the code, would have to be spelled out by means of six different flags, whereas for "England," which was in the code, one flag sufficed. Discussion will always be possibl

in regard to such things, and sayings that were at once put down in writing soon get strangely changed. Francis I., after Pavia, did not exclaim, "Tout est perdu fors l'honneur! though in a letter on the subject of the defeat he wrote something very like it. Napoleon III. on the afterno of the Sedan was represented as writing to the King of Prussia: "N'ayant pas pu mourir a la tete de mes troupes, il ne me reste qu'a deposer mon epec entre les maine de votre majeste" what he really wrote was: "N'ayant pas pu mourir," etc. There is no room however, for any confusion or conflict of readings in regard to Nelson's signal at Trafalgar, which must have been registered in the signal book, nad in many signal books at the time of the issue. Yet there are at least two versions, both claiming to be authentic; of which the later (and less authentic) was put forward at the naval exhibition.
