HE SHOT HIS SWEETHEART. Noecker Could Not Bear to See Her Suffer, He Told the Court in Berlin.

BERLIN, July 10.—A remarkable murder trial has just ended here. Hugo Noecker, a young married man and his sweetheart, went into a wood with the intention of poisoning themselves, their affection for one another having been discovered by the man's wife.

But the poison had been exposed to the air for some time and failed to act.

The next morning after again taking poison without effect, Noecker bought a revolver at the girl's request and returned to the wood.

The girl snatched the pistol from his hand and fired a bullet into her temple. The shot did not kill her outright and she lay writhing and groaning in agony.

"I dld not know what to do," Necker "I did not know what to do," Necker explained afterward. "It was a horrible sight. Suddenly it came into my mind that the only humane thing to do would be to end the poor girl's suffering. So I placed the revolver at hey head and fired again. Her stuggles then ceased. She was dead."

Then Noecker fired a bullet at himself, but without fatal result, and eventually he was arrested and put out trial. The court took a merciful view of the case and he was sentenced to imprisonment for only one year,
