BERLIN, Dec. 1—Considerable sensation has been created by the publication of a pamphlet entitled "The Emperor and His People; German Misgivings. By a Pessimist." The author is evidently, as the publishers describe him, "an eminent politician," who is behind the scenes of political life in Germany. He denicts the Emperor in Germany. He depicts the Emperor, in defiance of all accepted notions, as a man who does not take a really serlous interest in the administrative aflous interest in the administrative affairs of the country. Prince Buelow, he says, owes his success with his Majesty to his unique capacity for eliminating from his reports all dry-as-dust facts, and for presenting his information in an extremely condensed and entertaining form. The Emperor, adds the eminent politician, hates dull details and is ever anxious to case contails, and is ever anxious to ease con-versation of the burden of the concrete and to fly away on the wings of imag-
