DUKE MINISTERS BORE THE RESTLESS KAISER

When Obligated to Hear Their Reports He
Plays With His Dogs.

BERLIN, Dec. 1.—Considerable sensation has been created by the publication of a pamphlet entitled "The Emperor and His People; German Misgivings," by a peasant. The author is evidently, as the publishers describe him, "an eminent politician," who is behind the scenes of political life in Germany. He depicts the Emperor, in defiance of all accepted notions, as a man who does not take a really serious interest in the administrative affairs of the country. Prince Buelow, he says, even his success with his Majesty to his unique capacity for eliminating from his reports all dry-as-dust facts, and for presenting his information in an extremely condensed and entertaining form. The Emperor, adds the eminent politician, hates dull details and is ever anxious to ease conversation of the burden of the concrete and to fly away on the wings of imaginative generalization.

An extremely amusing account is given of his Majesty's method of dealing with dull statesmen. He listens with barely concealed impatience to their pedantic statements, playing the while with his dachshund, which he chases around the room until they get entangled in the legs of the Minister (Count Tsoodovsky is named), who forthwith becomes confused, loses the thread of his discourse and is immediately dismissed to his home with mocking words of consolation from the Emperor.

His Majesty does not tolerate the least familiarity from his own subjects, but he associates with Americans on terms of free and easy equality. During the Kiel regatta week Allan Armour was seen slapping the Emperor on the shoulder, and Mr. Vanderbilt, with a smile, told his Majesty that he was a good fellow.

The Emperor enjoyed the Americans' manner, and associated with them for pleasure and with the intention of gaining valuable knowledge of the great republic where personal liberty and enterprise are, he believes, most fully developed.

MEMENTOES STOLEN FROM ROYAL ACADEMY

Burglars Make Off With Jeweled Orders,
Swords and Other Precious
Gems.

HANOVER, Dec. 1.—Burglars entered the Guelph Museum at the latter end of last week and stole fifty jeweled orders, ornamental swords and other gems, valued at \$15,000.

The castle was the summer residence of the former King of Hanover, George V., founded here the Guelph Museum, containing valuable portraits, and among other objects of historical interest a complete collection of all the decorations in use during the time of the Georges. The museum is a detached building some distance from the castle, and it seems that the burglars effected an entrance by breaking a window on the ground floor without disturbing an attendant who was sleeping on the premises.

They abstracted the contents of a large glass case, in which were fifty orders worn by King Ernest Augustus. Among them were the insignia of the Garter and two Orders of St. Patrick, two Stars, one of each of the Orders of St. Michael and St. George, a number of Hanoverian orders, the Prussian Black Eagle and the Russian St. Andrew.

MELBOURNE, Nov. 29.—Influence is being brought to bear upon the Federal government to prosecute the local representatives of the American oil companies under the Anti-Trust Act. SHOT WHILE IN TREE TOP, BOY FELL TO GROUND AND EXPIRED

Sad Accident at Waweg in Which Otis Bell, Aged Seventeen Years
Lost His Life—Rifle Accidentally Discharged.

ST. STEPHEN, Nov. 30.—A fatal gunning accident took place at Waweg yesterday by which Otis Bell, aged seventeen years, was killed. It seems the deceased was with a party hunting. Bell and Giles Hartford separated from the others. After going some distance they became confused as to the locality and position of the settlement. Differing as to the position, Hartford told Bell he would climb a tree and ascertain correctly, but the other, supposing that he was allowed to climb the tree, as he was the younger, he went up and fired his rifle and shot himself in the head.

GLERGYMAN EXPOSED THROUGH COMMON GOSSIP

His Relations With His Housekeeper Caused
Talk—Case Now Before the
Privy Council.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—A very remarkable case is now being heard by the Privy Council, coming up on an appeal from the decision of the Bishop of Mauritius cancelling the appointment to the post of vicar of the Rev. E. R. Ward. The appellant was a clergyman of the Church of England and a married man, and he applied to be nominated for the post in question. Prior to his application he had known a lady who according to her own evidence was married at sixteen to a commercial traveller named Lovell by whom she had three children. Lovell died and she found herself in straitened circumstances. She became a waitress at a restaurant. She had in these altered circumstances asked the appellant if he could assist her, and he appears to have willingly done so. When he obtained the nomination to the vicarage at Seychelles he took her and one of her three children out there with him. He introduced her as his niece who had come to keep house for him, but Mrs. Grundy very soon alleged that if they were not married they ought to be. The bishop soon heard of this rumor and wrote to the appellant, who while admitting that Mrs. Lovell was not his niece, denied that there had ever been any misconduct between them. When it was understood that he would present himself for cross-examination, he stated that he had no intention of doing so, and the reason he gave for refusing to be examined was that the question of his alleged misconduct with Mrs. Lovell was a secular and not an ecclesiastical matter. The Earl of Halsbury said if there had been a subject matter of appeal it was only necessary to say that there was ample evidence for holding that the Bishop was right. In the opinion of the board today they had no jurisdiction to entertain such an appeal as this.
