INSURANCE REDUCED ON COMMERCIAL RISKS ONLY

There Was Never Any Increase on Residential Property So These Promulgations Will Not be Altered.

There appears to be some slight misunderstanding regarding the reduction of insurance rates following the installation of the new water system. The underwriters, at a meeting yesterday, decided to take off the 25c per \$1000 which was added a couple of years ago. This, it should be remembered, applied only to commercial risks. When the increase first went into effect, no change was made in the schedule with regard to residential property and consequently there will be no reduction on these properties. Some insurance agents in John are now receiving visits from householders, who are anxiously inquiring when their premiums on residences are to be reduced. The only reduction will be on those policies on which commercial increases was made.

STMR. CAMDEN ESTABLISHES A RECORD FROM BOSTON

Made the Coastwise Trip in Little More Than Thirteen Hours—A Thousand Passengers.

Two eastern liners arrived this morning from Boston. The Calvin Austin came at nine o'clock with a good freight and about eight hundred passengers, and the Camden at 11:30 o'clock on the coastwise trip with one hundred and six passengers.

The arrival of the Camden at such an early hour establishes a new record for the route. She left Boston at 9 o'clock yesterday morning for Portland, Lubec, Eastport and St. John. Her actual time was just thirteen and a half hours from Boston to St. John. Captain Allan and the other officials of the line have reason to be proud of it.

The Calvin Austin which left Boston at 11:30 o'clock yesterday morning was in company nearly all last night with the Camden and the steamers only parted when the Camden went into Eastport this morning.

STREET MATTERS BEFORE THE BOARD MEETING

Board of Works Will Consider Plan for Permanent Pavements—Dispute With St. Ry. Regarding Snow Removal

The meeting of the board of works which will be held tonight promises to be an interesting one. Ald. McGoldrick, who has been prominent since opening to make some new suggestions for the conduct of his department, will now have his opportunity. The alderman will probably outline a scheme for permanent pavements for some of the streets and endeavor first to way by which such a scheme could be financed. He says that the people want good streets but don't want to spend money to get them.

The board of trade at a special meeting this afternoon will take up the matter of the removal of snow on the streets over which the cars run. At a meeting of a sub-committee the recommendation was made that the city enter into a contract with the Railway Co. to remove the snow at the rate of \$12.00 per year, the term of the contract to be ten years.

It is understood that a communication from the St. John Railway Co. will be presented protesting against this arrangement and stating that the railway will not consider the contract for a larger term than ten years. If the company and the city do not come to an agreement on this matter the railway will have to do the work themselves.

A number of other important matters will also come before the meeting.
