SHOE-SHINE BOYS LIVE IN PEONAGE

Said to be Made to Work Like Slaves.

Tips Do Not Benefit Them—Compelled to Empty Their Pockets into Proprietor's Till.

TORONTO, Aug. 27.—A Greek shoe-shiner who has Anglicized his name into George Williams, and who has a stand of his own in a local hotel, has taken up the cause of his less fortunate fellow-countrymen who work in some of the Greek shoe-shine parlors in the city and who are unable to speak English as well as Williams can. He claims that owing to their ignorance of the language and of their rights, many of these boys are kept in a state of slavery, and he believes that if public attention is called to the matter there is a chance that conditions will be bettered. The boys are hired by the proprietors of the parlors (Greeks who have amassed some capital) at a small wage, from \$125 to \$150 a year. They are not paid until the end of the year, and not even then unless they are leaving to seek other employment.

NO UNION HOURS HERE.

If they are remaining, the boss continues to hold their money for them, while if they leave they seldom receive the full amount due them. They are tendered half or three-quarters of the sum, and in their ignorance and helplessness the boys accept what is offered and take no steps to get the balance. Their hours of labor are from 6 a. m. to 11 p. m., while after closing Saturday night they are kept for a couple of hours cleaning up the shop, then they are made to spend Sunday in washing their own clothes. The hours of labor were formerly from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m., but one concern inaugurated the longer period, and the others followed suit. The boys are discouraged from talking to outsiders or learning anything about general conditions, and Williams says that there have been instances where they have been beaten by the bosses for disobeying in this particular. He also tells of another case where a boy who insisted on leaving and drawing his full pay was later assaulted by the two partners who employed him. The lads are lodged in premises provided by the bosses, and one concern keeps its thirty or more boys in rooms over a small shoe-shine parlor.

MUST SURRENDER THEIR TIPS.

On Saturdays, when business is brisk, the boys go for their meals in turn, and the last boy to go for what should be his noon meal frequently does not get it until 4 o'clock, and then he gets nothing more until Sunday morning. Good health is impossible under such conditions, and Williams says that the shoe-shine colony lost two boys by death last year, while four others were sent away sick, their employers making the necessary payments out of the money due them. The most amazing statement made by Williams is that the boys are not allowed to wash a single cent of the tips which they receive from generous patrons. The boys average \$9 to \$15 a month in tips, but before leaving the shops each day, they empty their pockets into the proprietor's till. If they are discovered to have kept back even a dime they are called to account.

HAD A PRESENTIMENT OF APPROACHING EVIL

As a Result One Life at Least is Saved—

Fire Destroys House of Mr. Fred Moore.

One life and perhaps more was saved Saturday night through the foresight of coming evil which was felt by two persons. One of these was the five-year-old daughter of Fred Moore and wife of Manawagonish road, whose home was totally destroyed by fire last night before last, the other was George Thompson, chief of the Park Hotel, a friend of Mr. Moore.

The fire Saturday night which destroyed Mr. Moore's house started from a source unknown. The members of the family barely escaped with their lives, saving only two chairs and a tool chest from the flames. The dwelling was practically new and was not heavily insured. The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Moore usually sleeps in that part of the house in which she had her bed, and had she slept there Saturday night undoubtedly would have perished in the flames, as the family did not awake until that portion of the building was consumed. The child was not sleeping in her own room when the fire started, for the reason that she had insisted on sleeping with her parents. She could assign no reason for the unusual change, but also—

COONEYITES AWAIT END OF THE WORLD

Peculiar Sect Which Bars Sec-ond Suit of Clothes and Discards Collars

Grows Attracted Daily and Many Converts Succumb to Stronuous Preaching.

BELFAST, Aug. 27.—Two thousand "Cooneyites" a remarkable sect, whose creed is to expect the millennium at any moment, are conducting a "revival" on an enormous scale at Ballinacorney, County Fermanagh, where house and grounds have been completely given over to them for the time being by the owner, John West, who is himself an enthusiastic member of the sect.

Energy is the keynote of the campaign. Preaching and devotional exercises are in progress throughout the day, with public baptisms of converts at intervals. In order that the millennium come as suddenly as it may, and find them well occupied, single addresses last as long as five hours. When one is finished another begins. At last the pilgrims snatch a few hours' rest in the open air, rising at dawn to begin again.

CROWDS FROM EVERYWHERE.

Great crowds flock every day from all parts of Ireland to see the "dippers" as they are called. Many are infected by the energetic spirit of the campaign, and are promptly admitted to the brotherhood by immersion in the river.

No collections are taken. On the other hand, refreshments are provided for visitors to their meetings. They claim to travel without money, earning their way, in many cases, by manual labor. The house is accommodating about 100 persons, while the out offices have been utilized for sleeping purposes. Spacious marquees are erected on the lawn, and a large loft in the yard has been converted into a dormitory for the pilgrims.

The most complete culinary arrangements have been made for the members of the sect attending the convention. An out office has been utilized as a cookhouse; an old wine cellar has been turned into a bakehouse, and the baggage is done by members of the sect. Butchers prepare meat, and pilgrims skilled in butter-making are busy in a dairy. Almost every trade is represented at the convention.

They have their own cycle repairers, barbers, carpenters, tailors, dress-makers, watchmakers, cobblers, etc. A temporary post office has been erected close to the house, and there is also a public office for the use of visitors. Religious meetings are held daily, but Sunday is specially set apart for general devotional exercises, and the services are attended by over 3,000 people. At the services the women do not mingle with the men. The former are very plainly clad, and the majority of them wear sailor hats. The men pilgrims, who are unshaven, formerly discarded collars and ties, but now some of them wear low rubber collars. They are not allowed, it is said, to have a second suit of clothes, and only provide themselves with a second shirt as an absolute necessity.

NO WORLDLY POSSESSIONS.

The Cooneyites do not believe in worldly possessions, and several of their followers were men of wealth and influence. One of the principal leaders of the sect is Edward Cooney, who is the son of an Enniskillen merchant. He was formerly a commercial traveler. Associated with him is William Irvine, at one time an engineer, who has traveled in nearly all parts of the world.

The pilgrims are opposed to all the churches. One of the chief characteristics of their belief is the principle of immersion in a running stream. The "dipping" ceremony is performed in the river which runs along the valley at the northwest side of Crookacreevy House. One of the leaders act as celebrant, and when he reaches the bank of the river, takes off his boots and wades into the water. Having reached the center of the stream, he folds the "convert's" arms places his right hand on the man's chest and his left on the back of his shoulders, and then repeats the words: "I baptize you in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost." He next gently lowers the "convert" backward until the whole body has been immersed.

LAUNCH CAPSIZES, FOUR MEN HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

Keep Themselves Afloat for Nearly an Hour Until Rescuers Arrive.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 27.—Four men had a narrow escape from death

late this afternoon when the 51 foot launch Allgro caught fire and burned at a point about three miles east of Brenton's Reef Lightship. Thrown into the water by the capsizing of the tender in which they had taken refuge from the burning launch, the four occupants kept themselves afloat for nearly an hour until rescuers arrived.
