ENORMOUS WEALTH OF UNITED KINGDOM

LONDON, March 1—Some idea of the enormous wealth of the United Kingdom may be obtained from an official statement made by the Registrar General, Sir John Lubbock, during the twelve fiscal years 1917-18 to 1928-29.

The aggregate net capital value of the estates was £1,361,380,000, with an average income of £1,361,380,000 per annum. The average value of these estates was £2,886 each.

The valuation for the first year of the period named, with 1,491 estates, was £1,224,700,000, and the average value of the estates was £22,250 each. The valuation of the last year was £1,361,380,000 for 75,244 estates, with an average value of £1,809 each.

The largest total net capital value in the twelve years period was reached in 1928-29, when the aggregate net capital value of £1,361,380,000 was reached, an average capital value of £22,250 each.
