FOREIGN VIEWS

TOLD IN BRIEF

Garden Party will be Given for the Prince at Quebec—Two Hundred Hydro-Electric Employees Strike.

Cut in Diamond Duty.
Washington, May 31.—Diamond importers have scored a victory before the senate finance sub-committee in charge of the sundries schedule of the tariff bill, the committee having decided upon a reduction in the proposed Underwood rate of 20 per cent. ad valorem on cut diamonds. The present ten per cent. rate may be restored but it seems more probable that the 10 per cent. rate eventually will be determined upon.

Hydro-Electric Employees Strike.

Toronto, May 31.—Over two hundred line-men, construction men, operators and laborers of the Hydro-Electric System went on strike Friday, following the announcement of the new scale of wages to be adopted by the Hydro-Electric Co. The reasons for the strike, the men claim, are that the wages are an increase of about 10 per cent., as far as the envelope is concerned, but certain holidays the men had been taken away, which almost nullifies the increase.

Child Killed by Royal Train.

Madrid, May 31.—Gen. Anzar, chief of the train, told a story of a child being killed at Alcala by the Royal train, on which the King was travelling yesterday. Two little girls were on the track at a grade crossing, one of them lying alongside the line apparently asleep, when the train passed. The engine driver did not see the children until the train was quite close to them and was unable to stop the train in time. King Alfonso looked from the window of his car to ascertain why the train was slowing down, and on seeing that one of the children had been struck, he jumped from the window of the still moving train, ran back and took the child in his arms.

Baronne Larvete Injured.

Paris, May 31.—Baronne Larvete, the first woman to be granted an aviator's license was seriously injured yesterday while on her way to Buc Aerodrome in an automobile. The car collided with a delivery van and Baronne Larvete was thrown out and terribly cut about the head. Last year she was in an automobile accident in which Charles Valentin, a young aviator and inventor met his death.

Garden Party for the Prince.

Quebec, May 31.—Prince Albert, son of King George, together with his comrades cadets on the H. M. S. Cumberland, will be entertained at a garden party at Spencerwood by the Lieutenant-Governor and Lady Langcler, on June 10. It was previously decided to give a garden party on the king's birthday, June 3, but when the Lieutenant-Governor learned that Prince Albert was to arrive here on the 5th, he tried to have the prince's birthday changed to allow the latter to attend the function, and sent his aide-de-camp, Captain Victor Pelletier, to Halifax for that purpose, but the prince's programme could not be altered. Now a state dinner will be given at Spencerwood on the king's birthday, June 3, and a garden party on June 10. The reason of this modification is that Prince Albert, as well as all the other marine cadets, cannot attend a state dinner, being obliged to board the ship before seven at night.

Found Infected Swine.

Brantford, Ont., May 31.—Hog cholera was discovered in this city this week, and fourteen head were shot at the order of Dominion Inspector Purdie. The swine were shipped to a Brantford packing house from an outside point and disposed of locally. The authorities propose to trace the source of supply and carry out a rigid investigation.

The Daily Hint from Paris.

Prof. Ewen MacMillan, son of Hugh MacMillan of Cornwall, who has been secretary of Agriculture in South Africa for some years, has been promoted to the position of Superintendent of the Agricultural College at Potchefstroom in the Transvaal. Prof. MacMillan will have the hearty congratulations of many friends in his native province.

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SON OF JOSEPH JEFFERSON SECRETLY MARRIED TO MISS VIVIAN MARTIN

Fredericton, May 31.—This morning Harris G. Penney, Registrar of the Divorce Court, reported that five cases had already been filed for the July session of the court, this being just one more than the largest number on the record up to this time. The papers in the first case were not served this morning and thus the parties were not available, but the fifth case is on the docket. The other four cases are: Case vs. Case, Hawthorne vs. Hawthorne, Astles vs. Astles, Leaman vs. Leaman.

The last named case is the only one of the four of which the details have not been made public. The parties in this case are residents of Moncton and the case is unique in divorce history of this province, inasmuch as the couple who are the principals have had twelve children born to them since their marriage.

Alexander Leaman is the plaintiff and his wife, Angella, formerly Miss Chappell, is the defendant. They were married in 1885 and he is now 52 years old, while his wife is upwards of 45 years of age. The marriage ceremony was performed at Moncton by Rev. Thomas J. Delaney, a Methodist minister. Mr. and Mrs. Leaman lived together down to January 25th, 1911, when Mrs. Leaman left her home and has not since returned. Mr. Leaman charges his wife with unfaithfulness and names two Moncton men, Laban O'Brien and Patrick Scott, as co-respondents. Mr. Austin A. Allan, barrister, of Moncton, is the proctor for the plaintiff in the suit.

While no formal announcement of the engagement had been made, it has been known to their friends for several months that they probably would be married. Mr. Jefferson returned to New York only a short time ago.
